Kellogg, new As-sistant Professor of Rural Sociology Department, arrived Thursday and started Friday morning teach-ing his classes in Social Psychology, the Family, Modern Social Theory, and Social Research, Dr. Kellogg has done graduate work at Northwestern University; the

State University of Iowa, and the University of Missouri. He planned to get his Ph.D. degree this June, but upon acceptance of his new job, must wait until August of 1942 or June of 1943. 
