SUMMER INCREASES IN LAUNDRY ALLOWANCE
Acting upon the urgent request of the Cadet Corps the laundry allowance and the laundry fee have been increased for the summer months. In order to put this change into effect July 6, 1942, it will be necessary for all students to observe immediately the following instructions:

- The effective date of this change is July 6, 1942.
 - The laundry allowance is increased from a total of 25 to a total of 25 pieces per week, with a maximum of 5 shirts and 3 pair of pants.
 - The increased fee of 15¢ per week is to cover the cost of handling the additional one shirt and one pair of pants allowed over the present allowance of 4 shirts and two pairs of pants.
 - Excess laundry charges will remain the same for all excess pieces over the new summer allowance.
 - All students who have paid fees for the full semester must call by the Fiscal Office and pay the additional \$1.60 laundry fee before July 6.
 - All students receiving checks for the exact amount of the installment fees, and all students whose fees are paid in installments by checks direct to the College, must immediately inform the sender of these checks as indicated below:
 - (a) The installment payable July 15 will be \$29.55 instead of \$28.00; (b) The installment payable August 15 to 6 will be \$42.10 instead of \$41.50.
- The Fiscal Office and the Laundry desire to cooperate fully with the student body in this matter, and collect their cooperation in putting this change into effect with the least possible inconvenience.

Dean's Team Receives Laurels In Iowa College for Underdog

A unique college, which will accept only those boys who finish high school in the lowest 25 per cent of their class, has been established in Tabor, Iowa, a town of fewer than 1,000 residents. This amazing entrance requirement, setting the educational world topsy-turvy, was created by Dr. Robert Enlow O'Brien, preacher, educator, politician and businessman, the new president of Tabor college. Former president of Morning-side college at Sioux City, and former Iowa secretary of state, Dr. O'Brien has always wanted to run a college for the "lower

one-fourth" who seldom get invitations to college campuses these days. Last winter he got his chance. The president of Tabor resigned, and the college faced its second closing in its 30-year history. Some of the trustees asked Dr. O'Brien to take over. He agreed, on the understanding that he could introduce his scholarship ideas. English composition is taught as a "remedial" course, stressing correct spelling and use of clear, coherent, proper sentences. Mathematics is of the statistical and accounting varieties. The rest of the course follows traditional liberal arts lines.

Southwest Coaches Transfer Duties to Conditioning Navy

There may be some coaches and athletes left in the Southwest, but the midshipmen of the United States Naval Academy aren't so sure about that.

They have only to walk down the Terrace Deck of historic Bancroft Hall to see such fellows as Jack Gray, Texas university basketball coach, Marty Karow, head man of the Texas Aggie quintet last winter, Clyde V. Lee, moulder of those great football teams at Kilgore Junior College; Walter P. Roach, Texas Christian university freshman mentor; Flynn Freddie Wolcott, Rice Institute's great hurdler of a few seasons ago, Billy Patterson, the ex-Baylor university backfield star, and many other noted sports figures of the wide open spaces.

These men are among 48 Texans who have taken leave from their civilian school posts to help toughen up the Navy's Air Cadets. "This is the greatest program with which I've ever been connected," declares Karow, one-time all-American fullback at Ohio State university who has coached at Texas, the Navy Academy and Texas A. & M.

Gray and his colleagues are members of the second class of V-5 instructors being indoctrinated at the Academy. From here they will be assigned to the Navy's pre-

WSC Gives Nation Mighty Aerial Fighter

Pullman, Wash.—(ACP)—The top military student of his time on the State College of Washington campus, Earl R. Tash, is already becoming a legendary figure as a mighty aerial fighter in the Far East. Tash has received the Distinguished Flying Cross for his feats in the Lingayen Gulf area of the Philippines.

Tash was cadet colonel in 1939, the highest military post a student can attain. He was likewise first sergeant of Scabbard and Blade, military honorary; captain of WSC's rifle team which swept 37 out of 44 matches against the nation's best collegiate riflemen; and a member of the best combat squad in summer training at Fort George Wright.

Dr. Walter D. Coking, ousted dean of the University of Georgia college of education, has been appointed consultant in program planning by the federal security agency.
