



Enrollment at the first 10 universities is as follows: California (Berkeley), 13,968; Minnesota, 13,-484; Columbia, 13,072; Illinois, 12,-694; Ohio State, 11,730; New York University, 11,698; Michigan, 11,-226; Wisconsin, 10,545; Texas, 9, 579; University of Washington 8,774.
