

Free Movies To Be Shown Tomorrow

OWI Films Present 5 New Shorts Featuring MacArthur And "Give Me Liberty"

At Assembly Hall

Free movies will be shown at the Assembly Hall at four o'clock on Sunday afternoon. Tomorrow afternoon's program is made up, with one exception, of an excellent group of movies about our war activities and those of our allies and the leaders involved in them.

MacArthur, American Soldier is a record of the peak moments in the fighting career of our famous general. We see scenes of him in France during the last war; being sworn in as chief of staff, and as an observer in France and Germany. Recent, exciting shots show him stationed in the Phillipines and his spectacular flight to Australia.

Manila Bombed is one of the most incriminating documents we have on the atrocities of the Japs. After MacArthur has declared Manila an open city, the Jap bomb-ers roar overhead causing widespread destruction; callously mutilating civilians and blowing their homes skyward. Here is an example of completely lawless war. The history of the bombing of Manila Fall of the Phillipines, a book by Carlos Romulo, Phillipine newspaper editor and aide to General MacArthur.

The British Commandos and their daring leader, Lord Montbatetn, have become legendary. The fast moving ten minute film, Britain's Commandos in Action, pictures one of their Norweigan raids on Nazi garrisons. The Commandos take off under fire. There is fighting in the streets and from house to house, explosions, fires, and Nazi planes being shot down. The sound and commentary with this film are both unusually good. Bismarck Sea Victory shows de-

tailed scenes from the now famous sea battle.


