Pile Up Forty-Seven Points In Aerial And Ground Attack

After getting off to a rather slow start in Friday night's game with Franklin, the A. and M. Consolidated Tigers let go with a devastating aerial and ground assault, overcoming a 6 to 0 lead, which netted them a total of 47 points and gave them their third victory of the season.

It was Cashion's brilliant passing and running, coupled with Carroll's pass snatching and colorful offensive play, that made victory sure for the Tigers. Cashion tossed to Carroll three times for scores. The first in the first quarter from the Lion 32-yard line; period good for 30 yards, and the third in the final stanza from the Lion 31.
