The Mayflower of the Pilgrims was a ship of 180 tons, and she carried 102 persons to the shores of New England.

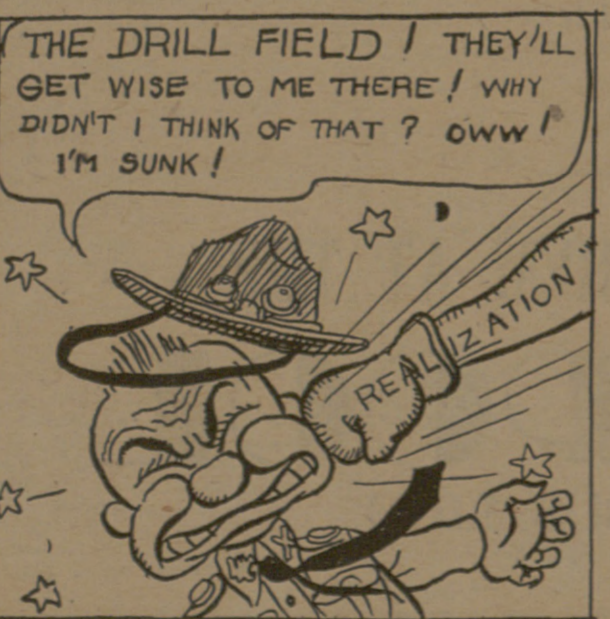
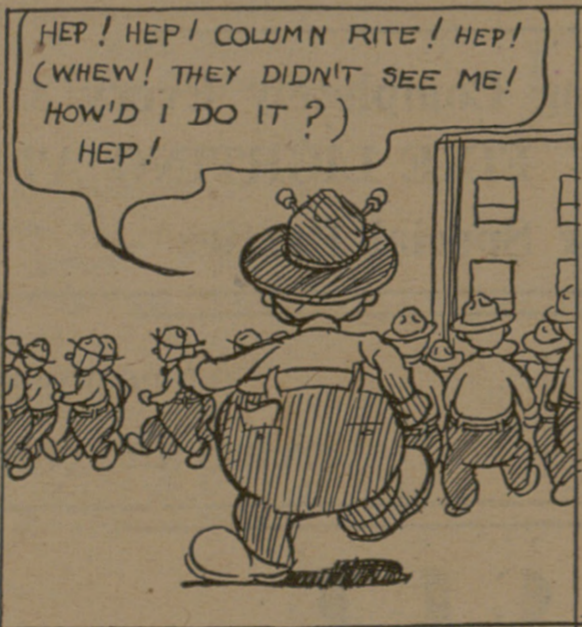
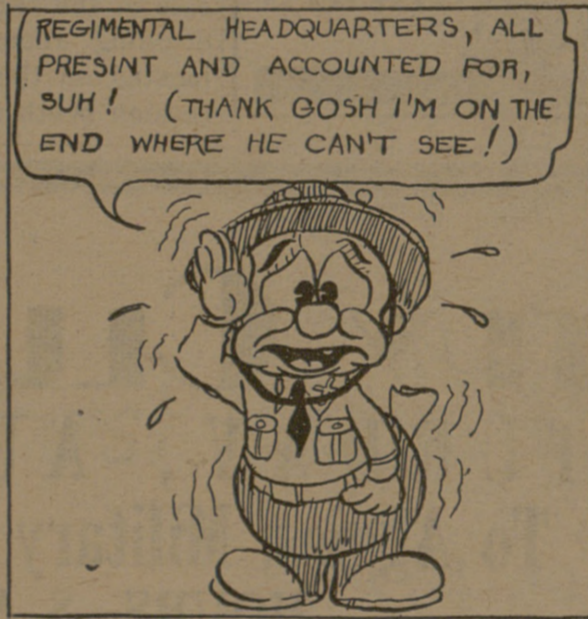
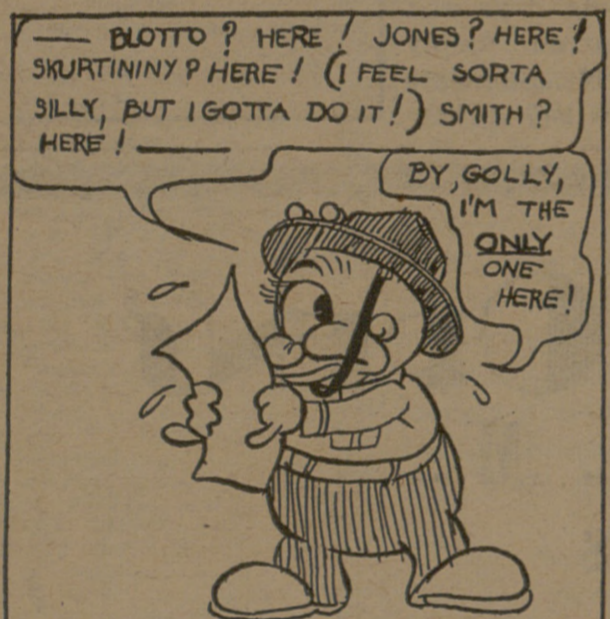
Aggie Exes Promoted, Awarded Citations

Word has been received from three different army headquarters about Aggies serving under their command. Harold J. Robertson, who is a Lightning fighter pilot with the 13th Army Air Fighter Commands White Knights squadron, has just been promoted from second to first lieutenant. His home is in San Diego, California, and he graduated from A. & M. in 1942.

Private William T. Davis, class of 1945, is with a reconnaissance company which paced the Fifth Army's advance in Italy to Leghorn. Sixty percent of the outfit have been decorated with either the Order of the Purple Heart or the Silver Heart.

Corporal Leo Tatum of Comfort, Texas, has been overseas with a veteran 15th Air Force Heavy Bombardment squadron for 16 months.
