The substance of the order perreads as follows:

"By direction of the President of the A. & M. College of Texas the prohibition against the seniors wearing boots as directed by the tember, 1942, is suspended until the close of next semester which will be 2 February, 1945.

"All cadet commissioned officers and academically classified seniors who are wearing the prescribed uniform and who are guartered with military units are authorized to wear boots as a part of the uniform on appropriate occasions.
