Lt. Col. H. R. Brayton, a former A gold medallion denoting his instructor of inorganic chemistry at A. & M., has been honorably discharged from the army and will resume his teaching at the college in October.

Brayton entered the service on Feb. 1, 1941 as a Major and was sent to the Edgewood Arsenal as the executive officer of the chemical warfare school and was later made director of training in the arsenal. He remained at the arsenal for two years and was then sent back to the college as Director of the War Department Civilian Protection School. He served in rank of Lt.
