DOG OWNERS

Beginning February 1 Ordinance 50 which was passed on May 23, 1940 by the City of College Station requiring all dogs to have attached to their collars a license tag will be enforced. These licenses can be obtained in the City Office. In order to obtain license tags for the dog a certificate from a licensed veterinarian must be presented showing the dog has been inoculated against rabies recently enough for such inoculation to be effective during the period for which the license is to be effective. We must cooperate with the Texas A. & M. College in controlling rabies in our city for the protection of students and citizens of our city.

If dogs are picked up not bearing a city license they will be destroyed within 48 hours unless called for by the owner who must pay a \$2.50 fee plus cost of the license before the dog can be released. If it is impossible to capture the dog Ordinance 50 authorizes the City Marshal to destroy it. Please cooperate with us in this matter. City of College Station.

Ed. Note: Texas A. & M. College complies with the above mentioned ordinance as though it were a part of the city administration.

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
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
