ing factor to some men) without obtaining the hours required to complete a semester work.

4. Many veterans, older than the ordinary college student, are now returning to school and wish to complete their scheduled education in order to satisfactorily compete with the younger man having no such handicap as the returning veteran, whose education was positively curtailed.

5. Many students, if they cannot take a full semester's work this summer, will not desire to go to school. This means giving up their present living quarters, and leaves them faced with an employment problem this summer. This parti-

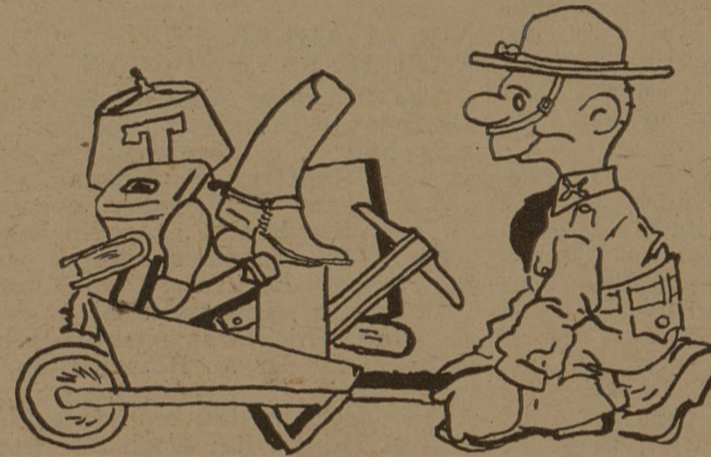
cularly affects the married veteran.

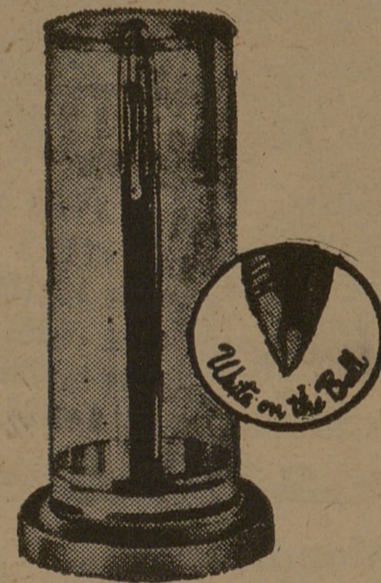
