Once again the cadet corps will be inspected by the federal authorities to determine the proficiency rating of the College's ROTC branch. Our honor is at stake. Our right to wear the blue star on the right sleeve of our blouses is at stake.

This blue star is important. It signifies excellence in knowledge of military science and tactics, in drill, in courtesy, in uniform, in discipline. It need not be said how much the wearing of this star means to students and to former students. All of us have a feeling of pride when we are asked, "What does that blue star mean?" and can reply, "It shows that Aggieland has the highest rating possible as an ROTC unit."

There will be a tough inspection this year by Army Ground Force officers. The military department has worked hard, the cadets have worked hard, to present demonstrations of the training which produced more army officers at A. & M. than at any other school.

The inspectors will be on the campus for four consecutive days, and during that time the corps will be under constant surveillance. Every cadet Aggie, from the lowest Fresh to the loftiest Senior must be constantly on guard for any offensive or damaging conduct or appearance.

Uniform regulations must be strictly observed. This means buttoned collars, unrolled sleeves, pants cuffs straight, shiny brass, and tan socks at all times when in uniform. During these four days, and especially on Monday and Tuesday, cadet officers and noncommissioned officers should be constantly on the lookout for any violations of these rules. Also, only freshly laundered khakis should be allowed for wear.

Army, that blue star is important to us all. Let's do our best during the inspection to show we deserve to be rated excellent.
