

Highland Park Swimmer May Crack Record in High School Meet Here

The annual Texas high school state swimming meet will get under way in the P. L. Downs, Jr., Natatorium on the Texas A. & M. College campus Saturday night at 7:00 with the possibility of a new record being set in the 100-yard breast stroke event. Fast time also is expected in the 220-yard freestyle and 50-yard freestyle races.

Coch Art Adamson says that Jimmie Flowers, the All-State football center from Highland Park (Dallas) high school, has a chance to better his mark in the breast stroke event. He is defending champion and a senior in high school. Adamson is hoping that the big boy decides that he would like to swim for the Aggies for the Cadets certainly can use men in his event. In addition Flowers also is a diver of no mean sorts and could win in that event also.

Adamson's son, Van, will also be

defending his 220-yard freestyle title but the Aggie coach says he does not look for the Consolidated high lad to break the existing high school mark set by Aggie's Danny Green before he entered the Navy. Another defending champion will be Bill Fischer, Brackenridge (San Antonio) 50-yard freestylist but that record is out of reach this year.

Teams have been entered from Bastrop, Arlington Heights of Ft. Worth, Austin, Stephen F. Austin and Lamar, of Houston, Forrest and Woodrow Wilson, of Dallas, Brackenridge and Thomas Jefferson of San Antonio. Others may enter before Saturday.

Adamson says that he expects a big crowd so those who care to take in this big annual event are advised to get there early to be sure of a seat. Admission is free to the meet, Adamson announced.
