Freshman Judging Contest Saturday At AH Pavilion

Saddle and Siroin Club will sponsor on Saturday at the Animal Husbandry Pavilion the Annual Freshman Livestock Judging Contest. Scheduled to begin at 8 a.m., the contest will feature nine different classes of livestock which includes: beef cattle with one fat beef class, one breeding Angus class, and one breeding Hereford class; sheep with one fat class, one mutton breeding class, and one fine wool breeding class; sows with one fat class, and one class of Berkshire Gilts; and horses with one class of farm mares.

The contestants will be chosen from the upper one-quarter of each Animal Husbandry 107 class, and a medal will be awarded the top man. In addition to the medal, the winner will have his name engraved on a plaque bearing such names as Jack Turner, Secretary of American Hereford Breeders Association. Additional medals will also be awarded to the second, third, and fourth place winners.

Committee in charge of arrangements for the contest, which is the first since 1940, includes J. H. Tobin, J. C. Garrett, R. R. Richardson, Vern Schmidt, E. R. Resendez, and C. T. Trickey. Faculty advisor is J. A. Gray of the Animal Husbandry department.
