

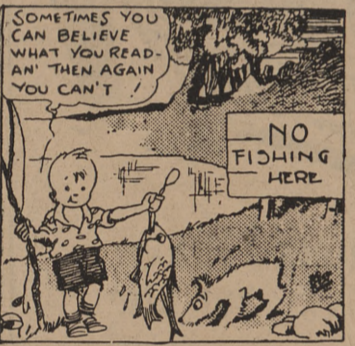

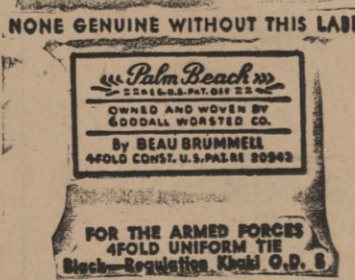
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Aero 221 Added To College Courses

Flight training Aero 221 became an active part of Texas A&M College's curriculum this week when 62 students reported to near-by Easterwood field, the college-owned airport, to begin work toward private pilot and instructor pilot ratings.
Although the college did some flight training as part of the war effort, in conjunction with the federal government, the present courses are the first ever offered by the college as part of its regular curriculum, according to Dean H. W. Barlow of the school of engineering, which originated the flight plan.
The college has been approved by the Civil Aeronautics Authority as an air agency to operate a primary and flight instructor flight school, Barlow said, and those who complete either of the courses successfully will receive a CA license as well as three hours of scholastic credit in the aeronautical engineering department, which is handling the ground school portion of the flight program.
Four new Taylorcraft planes have been obtained to augment existing training equipment at Easterwood field, Barlow said.
The 57 students selected for the first primary course and the five who will get instructor training were chosen from among 300 applicants on the basis of having the least time left before finishing college, Barlow indicated. Most of them are veterans attending college under the GI Bill of Rights, verbal approval of a contract to defray flight training costs having been obtained from the Veterans Administration.
The courses, which are to be expanded to handle larger groups next fall, are open to any person, whether attending college or not. Any veterans, Barlow says, may sign up for the course and have the cost paid by the V. A. if the contract now pending is signed formally.

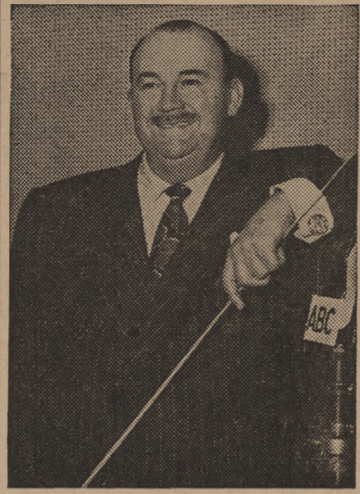

turn to College Station in September, Professor E. D. Parnell will be acting head of the department of poultry husbandry, Dean Shepardson announced.

Dr. Quisenberry received his Bachelor of Science degree in animal husbandry at A. & M. in 1931, took his Master of Science degree at the University of Illinois in 1933, with genetics as his major study, and received his Doctor of Philosophy degree at Illinois in 1936 with poultry breeding his thesis study. He returned to Texas A. & M. in 1936 as associate professor of genetics and continued his research work in poultry breeding. He is author of numerous scientific and technical papers in poultry subjects.

In announcing Dr. Quisenberry's appointment, Dean Shepardson stated, "We are glad to have a graduate of Texas A. & M. College so ably qualified for the position as head of our poultry husbandry department."
Prof. Reid has been head of the A. & M. College poultry husbandry department since 1923, coming here the year following receipt of his master of science degree in genetics and poultry nutrition at the University of Wisconsin in 1922. He received his bachelor's degree at Wisconsin in 1919 after teaching in public schools of Wisconsin for ten years following his first study in the Central Wisconsin State Teachers College in 1905-6. He served as high school principal and as county superintendent prior to his entry in the University of Wisconsin.

Prof. Reid has been active in the American Poultry Association, served as president in 1934 of the American Poultry Science Association, and was one of the prime movers in organization of the Texas Baby Chick Association in 1926.
