NCAA To Have Busy Week; Nat'l Meets To Be Held in Baseball, Track, and Golf

This coming week will certainly be a busy one for NCAA officials. What with the annual NCAA track and field meet, the national collegiate golf tourney, and the first national collegiate baseball tourney ever attempted, the National Collegiate Athletic Association will have its hands full.

The national collegiate baseball tourney, commonly called the college world series, will be held on the same order as the NCAA basketball tournament. Four of the best teams picked from the west will engage in a single elimination type of tournament to determine the western champ, while an eastern champ will be determined in a similar manner.

The eastern and western cham-pions and their runner-ups will form another four team tourna-ment the following week-end to de-termine the first, second, third,

Texas, Oklahoma, California, and Denver Universities will be the teams entered in the westerns play-offs. The Longhorn nine which meets Oklahoma in the first round Friday is favored to win the west

Each team entered in the west-ern playoff is the champion of its respective conference.

The national intercollegiate golf tourney to be held in Chicago and starting on Monday, June 23, will attract a record field of 268 entries from 67 different colleges and universities. The team favored to win the links tourney hails from Stanford University.

In Salt Lake City, Utah, on June 20 and 21, the NCAA track meet will be held. This meet, an annual

affair, will boast this year among its entries the bulk of the U. S. Olympic team for 1948. Colleges and universities from all over the nation will be sending their favorite sons in track and field events to Salt Lake City to strut their stuff.

From the Southwest Conference comes probably one of the best aggregations that any conference will send.

The Aggies will be represented by Art Harnden and Ray Hol-brook, two of the best quarter mil-ers in the nation, and George Ka-ders, hefty weight man. Texas University will send its ace sprinters Perry Samuels, Char-lie Parker and Allen Lawier plus its great distance runners Jerry Thompson, the iron man, and Don Sparks.

Arkansas will be represented by Clyde Scott, classy hurdler, while Rice's hurdler August Er-furth will be there also.

Bill Martineson and Stonie Cotten Baylor's sprinters are to be on hand to round out the Southwest Conference entries.

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
