George's Installs Two Cooling Units

Air conditioning equipment has just been installed in George's Confectionery by Barron Britton, Inc. of Bryan at a cost of more than \$1,000.

This equipment works on the evaporation principle and is expected to keep the temperature between 70 and 80 degrees, or approximately 15 degrees cooler inside than outside.

The system is composed of two units, each pulled by a one-horsepower motor and forcing in 9,500 cubic feet of air per minute. Then there is a 42-inch suction fan over the kitchen that pulls the cool air on through the building and takes out all kitchen odors.

Due to the construction of the building and the lack of insulation, installation of regular refrigeration type of air conditioning equipment was considered impractical.

Bryan Lady Wins Loving Cup In Model Plane Meet

Mrs. Doris R. Miller of Bryan was awarded a loving cup for being local high-point scorer at the model airplane contest held in Kyle field last Sunday.

Mrs. Miller's cup was one of the three posted by Bryan Plymouth dealers. Cups also went to W. W. Bone of Houston, who was high-point junior contestant, and Val-jean Feist of Houston, who won the junior workmanship and appearance event.

This contest was the second of its kind since the war's end. Sixty-four contestants participated in the competition, of which eleven received awards.

Student Injured In Chemistry Lab Explosion Wednesday

John D. Christian, 23-year-old veteran from Washington, D. C., was severely injured in an explosion which shook the laboratory in the basement of the Chemistry Building. The accident occurred about 4:30 Wednesday afternoon.

Christian suffered burns on the arms, face and neck. His eyes, although drenched with acid, were not blinded. He is being treated at the college hospital for his injuries.

Cause of the explosion is unknown. A mixture of concentrated hydrochloric acid and potassium permanganate crystals detonated while being heated. It was thought that impurities in one of the chemicals may have been responsible for the explosion. However, neither compound was found to have been contaminated.

Holmgreen Accepts Mission to Greece

E. N. Holmgreen, business manager of the college, has been offered a position with an agricultural section on a mission to Greece, it was announced yesterday.

A leave of absence from the college is being considered by the college officials and the board of directors at the present time. The mission should get under way within the next three weeks and will probably last a year.

Holmgreen was formerly with the American Military Government, having served as Civil Affairs Officer with the 34th and 36th Infantry, and as Executive Officer, G-5 Section of Civil Affairs, with the Fifth Army.

Hitch-hiking in Texas Illegal September 5

Hitchhiking, or any other form of soliciting rides, will become illegal in the state of Texas September 5, when the new code of traffic laws, recently passed by the legislature, goes into effect.

Fines ranging from one to two hundred dollars may be imposed for a violation of this law.

The new law not only refers to "thumb hitch-hiking", but also to soliciting a ride in any manner on a public road.

An entire new set of regulations governing pedestrians was included in the new traffic code.
