## Southside Market Duncan Snack Gets Renovations

Southside Food Market, owned and operated by Ray Oden, is spending \$5,000 on improvements to establish quicker and better Of Confidence

to establish quicker and better service.

In order to eliminate the rush-hour waiting and to speed up service. Oden has rearranged his store with new types of self-service equipment, including an open-cold self service case for meat, fresh fruit stands, frigidmist air conditioned vegetable stand, and package stands. Other improvements include large new-type cash register, bottle boxes, large scales, and two new-type slides to be used at the check-out counter.

In the open-cold service counter is arranged pre-packaged, cellophane-wrapped, priced and tagged meat items. Also all bacon, cheese, and lunch meat items will be available in the case.

The delay in weighing fresh fruits and vegetables was solved by having them weighed before coming up to the check-out counter. The problem of handling and storing cold drink bottles was solved by placing them in a convenient place near the back of the store. Students are in favor of continuance of Duncan Hall snack bar according to a survey conducted among the students of the New Area. Of the twenty-four students interviewed, all expressed approval; however, some suggestions for improvement of service were offered.

N. E. Lowrie from Terrell, chemical engineering major, thought it would be best to serve regular chow in the snack bar line during meal hours and use the snack bar at night. He was supported in this opinion by roommate J. J. Ross, petroleum major from Vernon.

B. J. Beckham was in favor of keeping the snack bar open during chow hours for those who might only want a sandwich. Beckham is an electrical engineering major from Phillips.

L. E. Hestmann, mechanical engineering major of Cameron, would like for the snack bar to be open on Sunday nights for benefit of those who return to the campus too late for the regular meal.

W. L. Hardcastle and H. R. Wiedenfeld, both business majors, expressed approval of the snack bar because it gave the students taking part in intramural sports a chance for late chow. Hardcastle is a native of Port Arthur and Wiedenfeld hails from Comfort.
