Aggie Quarter Milers Help Southwest Team Win Mile Relay at NCAA Meet

One of the features at the Annual NCAA Track and Field Meet held in Salt Lake City last month was a special mile relay event called the Centennial Relay in honor of the fact that Utah was celebrating its one hundredth anniversary.

As a result the Mid-West team finished fourth in the mile relay while the Far West was second and the East third.

July 8 will be celebrated through the state this year as "Uncle Billy" Dish day according to a proclamation made recently by Gov. Beauford Jester.

William J. Dish, better known to Southwest Conference baseball fans as "Uncle Billy", head baseball coach or director of baseball at the University of Texas for 26 years during which time his teams won 21 conference championships. Dish will be honored not only for his outstanding record in baseball but also for the example he has set in life as a clean living, loyal sports loving, and respected citizen.

Rumors have it that T. U. already has started to worry about their football situation next fall. It seems as though the "T" formation, being inaugurated at the University next fall by the new Longhorn head coach Blair Cherry, is not as easy for the backfield stars to learn as was hoped.

Bobby Layne, the ace fullback on the Longhorns 1946 team, will need a lot of help in handling the chores of the "man under". Paul Campbell, star of the Longhorn "B" squad last year, is one of the few Texas backs that has experience as the man under. Campbell ran from this position last year while on the "B" team. The only trouble is that Campbell is a little guy and he can not be depended on for too much work when the going gets rough.

McKenley, who is a Jamaican, was ineligible to run on the Mid-West's relay team because the event was limited to Americans.

Four relay teams were entered in this event. The four teams were made up of athletes from four different regions of the country: Southwest, Midwest, Far West, and East.

The Southwest team, consisting of Art Harnden and Ray Holbrook from Aggie, Dickie from L. S. U., and Boland from Colorado, won the event in the sensational time of 3:13.8. Boland, who is a Negro, hails from Louisiana which made him eligible to run on the Southwest team.

In the 440-yard dash Herb McKenley of Illinois was the victor in the record-breaking time of 46.3 seconds. His time exceeded by 3 seconds the world record for this event set by Ben Eastman, of Stanford in 1932. Boland was second and Harnden was fifth behind McKenley's spectacular performance.

Adams to Attend Tennessee Parley

Major League All Star Game To Be In Chicago July 8

On July 8 the national baseball spotlight will fall on Wrigley Field in Chicago which will be the scene of the fourteenth annual All-Star Game. A star-studded line-up was revealed when final tabulations were completed on balloting by 1,978,493 of the nation's baseball fans.

In the pitching department Feller is the big question due to his back injury. Feller is slated to start for the American League but his status is yet doubtful. If Feller is definitely out, Detroit's Hal Newhouser will be the probable starting hurler for the American League. Behind Newhouser are such steady hurlers as New York's Spud Chandler, Detroit's Dizzy Trout, and St. Louis' Jack Kramer. In the National League Ewell Blackwell of Cincinnati is expected to start. All eyes will be on Blackwell, as he has been the most talked-about pitcher this season. Back of Blackwell will be Harry (The Cat) Brecheen of St. Louis, Johnny Sain of Boston, and Ralph Branca of Brooklyn.

As a result of the poll conducted in forty-two states and in the District of Columbia, the fans' votes put DiMaggio, McQuinn, Mize, Cooper, and Walker in the line-ups. DiMaggio of New York received the greatest number of votes totaling 782,194 as revealed by the poll.

Turkey Day Tickets Limited To Two - Order Now or Be Scalped

Plans for the distribution of Texas Aggie football tickets for the 1947 grid season were announced here Wednesday by C. D. Ownby, business manager of athletics at the college. Former students and faculty members will be limited to two tickets for the Texas Aggie-Texas Longhorn game here on Thanksgiving Day, November 27, but unless the applications exceed expected demand there will be no reasonable limit placed on tickets for the Southwestern, Baylor and SMU games to be played here on Kyle Field.

Sales for games on the road, which include: Texas Tech at San Antonio; Oklahoma at Norman; LSU at Baton Rouge; TCU at Fort Worth; Arkansas at Fayetteville; and Rice at Houston, may have to be allotted based upon the applications received in relation to the number of tickets Texas A&M is allotted by the home school for those games.

After orders from former students and alumni have been filled on August 16 any tickets remaining will be placed on sale to the general public.

Application blanks are now being processed for mailing to all former students on the mailing list of the Association of Former Students who are now receiving that organization's paper, The Texas Aggie.

Applications will be accepted by mail or at the office of the Athletic Council beginning on the date of this announcement and close on August 9, 1947, from (1) Former Students, including "T" card holders, (2) Faculty members and administrative staff of the College.

Applications for the Texas University-A&M game to be played at College Station on November 27, 1947 will be limited to not more than two tickets for each former student or faculty member. Faculty members, who have already purchased coupon books for all home games, will not be eligible to

Little Chip is the third member of the famous Routh family to play football at A&M. Aggie fans remember Joe, the All-American guard here in 1936 and 1937; who was killed in Belgium during the recent war. Another member of the family was William (Chip) Routh who is remembered for his stellar tackle performances on the 1939 and 1940 teams.

Before going to the Point, Milton was on the 1942 freshman team here at A&M. Among the other Aggies at the Point are Hank Foldberg and Goble Bryant.
