

College Station Swimmers Set New Records At Houston Meet

The College Station athletic club swimmers came through with flying colors last Saturday night by winning six of the nine events in the senior division of the annual Y.M.C.A. swimming meet in Houston.

In addition to their winning performances, Van Adamson and Bernard Syfan set new meet records in the 200 yard free style and the 100 yard free style respectively. Adamson has been an outstanding high school swimmer for the past three years while at A&M Consolidated High School. Syfan was a letterman on the 1947 Aggie Swimming team.

Adamson came back to win his second event of the night by coping the 400 yard free style in 5:09.5. He was trailed by Billy Karow also of College Station.

In addition to Syfan's efforts in the 100 yard free style, he was second to Adamson in the 200 yard free style and he swam a leg on the winning free style team.

Both relay events were won by the College Station swimmers. The winning 300 yard medley relay team was composed of Bob Cowling, Ed Kruse, and Jack Riley while the members of the victorious 400 yard free style team were Syfan, Riley, Gene Summers and John Heeman.

In the 200 yard breast stroke, the only event which was swept

by the College Station swimmers, Cowling came home the winner after overcoming an early lead by Johnny Boyle.

In the junior division (for boys 14 and under) which was held on Thursday night, Gail Klipple of College Station was the star. Klipple set new meet records in the 50 and 100 yard free style races. His times in the events were 29.7 seconds in the 50 and 1:07.1 in the 100. He was the only double winner in the junior division.

In the intermediate division, Mike Muckleroy, state school boy 100 yard free style champ from San Antonio, won both the 50 and 100 yard free style races in record times. In both events, Van Adamson was second to Muckleroy, who returned to San Antonio after Friday's meet and therefore was unable to compete in the senior division on Saturday. The intermediate division which was held on Friday night is for boys 17 and under.
