In 1939, the Aggies had finished

the season undefeated and untied with a beautiful 21-0 victory over the Longhorns at College Station. What a wonderful feeling that must have been! Not only had they been named the best football team in the nation and finished the season with a record of ten wins, no losses and no ties but also they had beaten the orange and white on Turkey Day.

Then came the famine, and what a famine! It has lasted for seven long years and who knows when it will ever end.

In November, 1940, it was, that the black cloud of famine came over Aggieland and to this day that cloud has yet to move.

This is how it came about. The Aggies were on their way to another undefeated and untied season, and all that remained was to beat a mediocre Texas University team in Memorial Stadium. That didn't sound like too big an undertaking for John Kimbrough and

Company, but it was. The Ma-roon and White went down in defeat, 7-0, after playing one of their greatest games.

Since that gloomy November day in '40, very few faithful Aggies have been able to hold their heads up without feeling as though something is lacking—and rightfully so because something is lacking—Longhorn blood on the gridiron!

Everyone thought that '41 would be the year for revenge; then came that horrible nightmare on Kyle Field when Crain, Layden, and Company walked over the Aggies to the tune of 23-0. This marked the first time that the Longhorns had beaten the Aggies on Kyle Field.

But this wasn't the end, not by any means, as a matter of fact it was only the beginning. It happened again in '42, '43, '44, '45, and again last year as the famine continued at its peak with the Aggies bowing to the Longhorns in Memorial Stadium 24-7.

"How long can it last?" is the cry that we hear this summer at Aggieland as the '47 football season draws near. Can this be the year to end this jinx?
