man of the '47 Aggie nine had turned pro. Jacobs, it was reported, has signed a contract with the Cincinnati Reds in the National League. The ex-Aggie pitcher, who failed to make a K's in his grades at the end of the semester last spring, will probably be farmed out to some minor league club for seasoning. The right-handed mound artist, having won four games and having lost only one, will enter the play-for-pay game with a good season behind him.

Along the same line we heard the other day that Raymond Katt, slugging catcher for the Aggie Bees, has also joined the pro ranks.

Katt, who chibbed the ball at a 340 pace last spring, was one of the best prospects for Marty Karow's nine in '48.

The New York Giants are the culprits who lured Katt away from Aggieland. The youthful catcher, who was farmed out to Jacksonville in the Lone State League, may be seen in action next month when Jacksonville meets the Bombers in Bryan.

When Katt and Jacobs begin matching swings and pitches with the pros, they will have with them our best wishes for a successful professional baseball career.

National AAU Outdoor Swim Meet To Be Held In Tyler This Week-end

The greatest collection of swimming stars in more than a decade will invade Tyler, Texas next week-end for the National AAU outdoor meet. At least two world records and several American marks are expected to fall in the field of some 150 tankers.

It will require four nights to complete the meet although the first night, Thursday, will be given over only to the prelims for the 1,500-meter freestyle. Sixteen year old Jimmie McLane from New Haven, Conn. is the lad who is expected not only to win this event but to set a new world record in it.

Every 1946 outdoor winner will be there to defend his championship along with most of this year's indoor titlists.

Defending champions are Bill Smith Jr., Ohio State, 100 and 200-meter free-style; McLane, 400, 800 and 1,500-meter free style; Harry Holiday, Michigan, 100-meter backstroke and 300-meter individual medley; Joseph Verdeur,
