smoke of cookfires, welcoming the men home from clearing, forest, and trail. It was the bitter smoke of charred logs smoldering in heaps which that morning had been the homes of the settlers—perhaps also the unspeakable smoke of burning flesh, for more than one husband perished in the flames after his scalp was safely tucked in a sprayer's belt.

This is a story steeped in history. It is also a story of individuals, their suffering, their defeat, and in some cases, their survival. It is a story of Indians—real Indians who vary as all human beings—Indians who are impersonally cruel, simple and friendly, wise, brutal, sly, kind, proud, self-effacing, laughter-loving. It is a story of a woman's steadfastness in the face of mortal danger and the loss of all that had given her pride and confidence in living. In other words, it is a story worth reading.

Benedict and Nance Freedman, who have written plays and radio shows, have now turned their hands to the writing of a novel, **MRS. MIKE**. MRS. MIKE is first and foremost a love story, the story of Kathy, a young Irish Boston girl, and Sergeant Mike, a Canadian Mountie, who is priest, doctor, and magistrate to all in a great wilderness of millions of square miles. Kathy's and Mike's lives embrace a score of characters whose lives are lived out against the tremendous background of the wilderness, at times beautiful, at times terrifying and overwhelming.

The level of sheer entertainment is extraordinarily high. There is an acceptance of the hardness, the chances, the essential goodness of life that rings very true, and the dual authorship of the book gives both the male and female characters and added authenticity. It is emotional, unintellectual, and refreshing. It doesn't pose any great questions to the reader, or offer solution to life. It's just a well-spun yarn.

Information Staff Members to Attend Meet in Minnesota

Five members of the A & M College information staff will attend the annual meeting of the American Association of Agricultural College Editors at the University of Minnesota August 6-8.

They are Ted Moses, chief of the Agricultural Experiment Station's Division of Publications; Louis Franke, extension editor; Sybil Banister, assistant radio editor; Jack T. Sloan, visual aids specialist; and Frances Arnold, assistant extension editor.

Techniques in newswriting, publications, radio and visual aids will be discussed at the meeting. Exhibits of various information media used in the various states will be available for study.

Franke will serve as chairman of the agency relation committee which will make its report August 7 and will also serve as chairman of the agency relations discussion panel.

Four of the Texas representatives will fly to Minneapolis in the College-owned plane with H. G. Smith, manager of Easterwood Airport, as pilot.

Geology Prof At Work in Kentucky

Dr. W. L. Russell of the A. & M. Geology Department is spending the summer doing special research in structural field geology and radioactivity of different strata in northwestern Kentucky. S. A. Lynch, department head, has announced.

In his radioactivity studies Dr. Russell, who has been appointed by the Oxford University Press to write the chapter on radioactivity in a new edition of "The Science of Petroleum", is using equipment of his own design.

Veterinarian to Go To Cincinnati Meet

E. A. Grist, Extension veterinarian, will attend the annual meeting of the American Veterinary Medical Association in Cincinnati, Ohio, August 16-23.

Membership of this association comprises representatives of all of the 48 states and a number of other nations. A conference of Extension veterinarians will be held, at which work in connection with brucellosis and mastitis will be discussed.

Leland Attends Meet Of Accounting Board

T. W. Leland, head of the Department of Business and Accounting at A. & M., was in Chicago for a meeting of the board of directors of the American Accounting Association which was held July 26-28. Heading the department during his absence was Dr. T. R. Hamilton, professor of statistics.

Truck Steers Itself

If one of these days you should see a big truck come lumbering down the road with the driver making "Look! No hands!" gestures, don't you think he's crazy and take to the ditch in terror. It will only be Victor Severy's idea in action; you will be in no danger whatever. Severy, who hails from Atlanta, proposes to make motor vehicles automatically steerable by turning the job over to a photocell hook-up that will follow paint stripes running down the middle of the driving lane instead of along its side. From one side, underneath the vehicle, he throws a beam of light from a lamp with reflector. This beam, thrown back to the photocell on the opposite side, actuates the steering mechanism whenever the vehicle tends to drift off course. A second set, with lamp and photocell disposed oppositely to the first, takes care of deviations in the opposite direction. The gyroscope steering mechanism, or "Iron Mike", was long ago devised to relieve ships' helmsmen of most of their routine labor; and similar devices have also been in use for some time on airplanes. Severy's invention represents an effort to give the same advantages to the pilots of highway vehicles.

Exams for Merit System Announced

Competitive examinations for positions in the State Department of Health Laboratory and branch laboratories have just been announced by the Merit System Council for the Texas State Department of Health. Examinations are for public health laboratory positions, and will consist of an evaluation of training and experience and a written examination. Veterans preference will be allowed applicants who have been honorably discharged from the United States armed forces and who make a passing score on the examination.

All applications must be mailed before midnight August 30. Positions for which examinations will be held, and their entrance salaries, are: Laboratory Assistant (\$115); Laboratory Technician (\$161); Senior Laboratory Technician (\$201.25).

Next Chem Congress Set for US in 1951

The Twelfth International Congress of Pure and Applied Chemistry will be held in the United States in 1951, it was announced at the close of the eleventh Congress in London, first to be held since the war.

Dr. W. Albert Noyes, Jr., president of the American Chemical Society, said the 1951 meeting would probably be held in New York City.

Farrar Granted Aero Gas Patent

A patent has been issued G. L. Farrar, assistant professor of chemical engineering, for a process used in volume production of aviation gasoline.

The process, described as isomerization of normal butane to isobutane, was developed during the war when Farrar did research work for the Magnolia Petroleum company in its Dallas laboratories. It compares favorably, from an economic standpoint, with the widely-used Shell process, according to Farrar.

The patent has been assigned to the Socony-Vacuum Corporation, which Farrar left last February to accept his appointment here.
