Two Fourteen-Day Duck Hunting Seasons Open Nov. 4 and Dec. 16

Open seasons for duck hunting in Texas this year will be from November 4-17 and December 16-29, according to the Texas Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit and the A. & M. Department of Fish and Game. Under new regulations of the Department of the Interior, states west of a certain north-south line are allowed to choose either a season of 35 consecutive days or a split season of 14 days each. Texas has chosen the latter.

Both the hunting season and bag limits have been reduced in order to stem the noticeable decrease in waterfowl which has occurred during the past three years, according to the Secretary of the Interior, who states: "If the sport of wildfowling is to continue, we must regulate the take to less than the season's increase."
