

Phoning from Train Inaugurated Aug. 15

Telephone conversations between offices or homes and passengers on board speeding trains became available August 15, the Federal Communications Commission has announced.

An experimental service of this nature will be inaugurated on that date on several Pennsylvania and Baltimore and Ohio trains between Washington and New York. Tariffs, now filed with the commission, are comparable with similar rates for regular long-distance calls.

The plan is part of the Bell system's work on a radiotelephone program to develop apparatus and methods to bring the telephone network within reach of persons on trains, automobiles, airplanes and surface ships. An experimental installation for telephone service on the famous Boston Post Road connecting that city with New York was started nearly a year ago. In that system six 350-watt land transmitters are used. One is at each end of the line, and the other four at way stations. It is similar to the system already in use in several American cities which provides telephone service between homes or offices and moving taxicabs or delivery trucks.

Induction telephone service, a different type from the other installations planned, is proposed by the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Company, for passengers' use between Orange, Virginia and Cincinnati. The installation will cost nearly \$360,000, company officials estimate. Standing by itself, it would not be a profitable venture but the availability of the service is expected to attract additional travel.

This railroad telephone service for passengers is not the same as the radio service for train crews now in operation on many railroads and in a number of freight and terminal yards. About 100 authorizations for this type of service have already been given by government authorities. They cover some 75 land stations and 700 mobile units, since a single grant may cover from one to a hundred radio

British Scientists Aroused Over Pay For Inventions

British scientists are irked over the small reward in money which they get for important discoveries and inventions.

The latest case to arouse some ill-feeling is the award to Sir Donald Bailey, Sir Donald invented the famous Bailey Bridge. This portable bridge served Allied troops all over the world during World War II.

For this important contribution to victory, Sir Donald has been awarded 12,000 British pounds, slightly less than \$50,000. When taxes are deducted, the award will be about 4,000 pounds, or a little more than \$16,000.

One argument advanced is that Sir Donald invented his bridge when employed by the government. On the other hand, some British scientists complain that they get less than their government pays to foreign scientists for inventions.

Low rewards, charge some of the scientists, will cause some able men to seek occupations with greater opportunity, leaving the national burden in less capable hands.

Notice is hereby given to the real and true owners of the property described in the City Council of the City of College Station, Texas, by duly enacted ordinance, dated August 12, 1947, has determined the necessity for, and ordered the improvement of, the following described portion of Cooner Street in the City of College Station, Texas, to-wit:

COONER STREET from the right of way of Highway No. 6 to the North line of the City Limits of the City of College Station, Texas, by constructing, widening, grading and filling the same and installing concrete curbs and gutters where necessary, and other incidentals and appurtenances, and by the construction and appurtenances of a four foot roadway between curb lines and curbs, and by the construction of a compacted base, all as provided for and under the specifications prepared by the City Engineer of said city and on file in the office of said City Engineer.

That said City Council, after having duly and legally advertised for and received bids for the construction of said improvements, and after having opened and read the bids, and after having determined the lowest secure bid for the construction of said improvements on August 12, 1947, determined the necessity of levying a special assessment against the property abutting upon said street within the limits defined, and the real and true owners thereof, and did adopt and determine the herein defined and described portion of the same and the abutting property and the real and true owners thereof, and that the position of said city proposed to be assessed against the abutting property and the real and true owners thereof will be in accordance with the FRONT FOOT RULE OR F.F.A.M. and did further adopt the following proposed rates and estimated amounts:

The estimated amount per front foot to be assessed against such abutting property and the real and true owner thereof for said improvements exclusive of curbs and gutters in One Dollar and Thirty-five Cents (\$1.35) per lineal foot.

The total estimated amount per front foot to be assessed against such abutting property and the real and true owner thereof is Two Dollars and Seventy-five Cents (\$2.75) per lineal foot.

The estimated total cost of the whole improvement on said street within the limits defined, is Eight Thousand Six Hundred and Sixty-seven Dollars (\$8,667.00).
