Five Events in AAU Victory

The College Station Swimming Club added another feather to their already decorated cap last week-end in Fort Worth when they captured the Southwestern AAU Swimming Meet by amassing a total of 60 points in the two day affair. Trailing the Aggies by only six points was the Fort Worth Club in second place. Third place went to the University of Texas' Aquatic Club with 37 points.

The Meet, which was held at the Marine Pool in Fort Worth, attracted a total of ten teams from Oklahoma and Texas. Among the teams entered were The University of Oklahoma, Dallas Athletic Club, The Golf Crest Country Club of Houston, and the San Antonio Aquatic Club.

Coleen Gowan of the Dallas Athletic Club was high point man with three firsts which totaled 18 points. The tankers from College Station scored five victories in the finals Saturday night which gave them 30 of the 60 points necessary to win.

The 400-yd free-style relay team composed of Van Adamson, Johnny Heeman, Bernard Syfan and Danny Green, took first in their event with little trouble.

Jimmie Flowers, Aggie footballer who is expected to see a lot of action at tackle this fall, won the 100-yd breast-stroke with comparative ease in 1 minute 11.1 seconds.

Two other College Stationers who won individual races were Danny Green in the 100-yd free-style and Van Adamson in the 100-yd individual medley.

The fifth first place for College Station came in the 300-yd medley relay when the team of Adamson, swimming the backstroke, Flowers, swimming the breast-stroke and Green, swimming the free-style came home with the bacon.

Rev. Carlos W. Davis, Director of the Wesley Foundation and assistant pastor of the A. & M. Methodist Church, will teach three accredited Bible courses during the fall semester. The courses, to be taught at the church, will be Religious Education 318, 319, and 321.

Religious Education 318, The Acts of the Apostles, is a one-hour course, meeting Saturday at 9. Course 319, Pauline Epistles, offers two hours' credit and is slated for Tuesday and Thursday at 9. The General Epistles, 321, is a one-hour course, and it will meet every Friday at 11.

Rev. Davis received his BA Degree from Centenary College, Shreveport, Louisiana, and his Bachelor of Divinity Degree from Southern Methodist University.

Leland to Attend Accounting Meet

T. W.
