Martin J. (Marty) Broussard, of Abbeville, La., has been appointed trainer at A&M, according to an announcement made here August 26 by W. R. (Bill) Carmichael, director of athletics. He arrived on the campus and immediately went to work as successor to Lil Dimmitt, who has been trainer since 1935, but who resigned recently to enter the insurance business at Tyler.

Broussard is a graduate of Louisiana State where he lettered in baseball three years and basketball twice. He graduated in 1942 in physical education and became head trainer at his alma mater, a job he held for three and a half years before going to the University of Florida last season. He resigned there to accept the Aggie post. He is married and has one daughter.

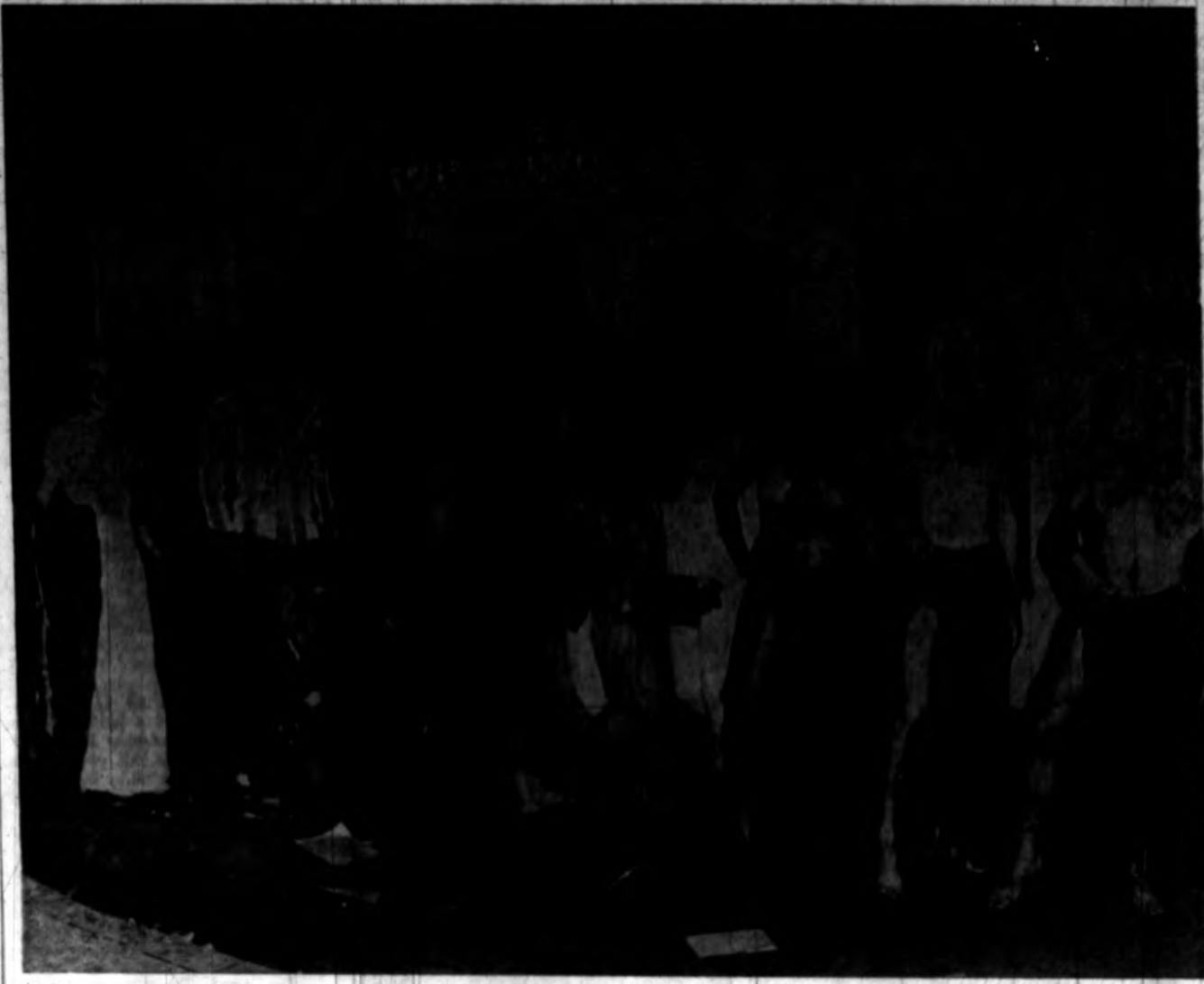
