

TECH STUDENTS KILLED

SAN ANGELO, Tex., Sept. 22 (AP)—Seven persons, four of whom were believed to be college students, were killed and one other critically injured late Sunday in a fiery truck-crash, 30 miles southeast of here.

Members of the Ralph Elliott family of Brady were riding in a pickup truck, which caught fire after the accident. All were killed. The others were occupants of a sedan and were believed by Capt. Ray Butel, state highway patrolman, to be Texas Technological College students returning to Lubbock from the Texas U. football game in Austin.

NEW FLORIDA STORM

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 22 (AP)—Storm warnings issued in a steady breeze on southern Florida's weary coast again early today as a second tropical disturbance stood just 90 miles southwest of the keys bearing 30-mile winds on a northward course.

The warnings went up from the Florida Keys to Palm Beach even as the battered peninsula and the ravaged gulf coast from Biloxi, Miss., to New Orleans counted 38 dead and anxiously contemplated flood waters left by last week's havoc-wreaking hurricane.

ALAMO DOWNS BURNS

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Sept. 22 (AP)—The grandstand and paddock of the old Alamo Downs race track near here lay in virtual ruins today as the result of an early morning fire yesterday that caused damages estimated between \$280,000 and \$300,000.

GIFT GIVEN AUSTIN COLLEGE

SHERMAN, TEX., Sept. 22—(AP)—Gift of \$600,000 to Austin College, 99-year-old Presbyterian institution here, has been made from the estate of the late M. B. Hubble of Charlotte, Tex., Dr. W. B. Guernsey, college president, announced Saturday.

TO RETURN WAR DEAD

NEW YORK, Sept. 22—(AP)—The New York port of embarkation announced Saturday that the remains of the first American war dead to be returned from European battlefields would arrive on the U. S. Army transport Joseph V. Connelly during the last week in October.

CARDI LEAVES BRAZOS

HIO DE JANEIRO, Sept. 22—(AP)—Former King Carol of Romania and his bride, the former Elena Lupescu, boarded the Argentine ship Dona De Garay Saturday, bound for Portugal. The former monarch, now 61, and his 45-year-old bride eluded reporters. It was believed they might go from Lisbon to France, but no announcement was made of their plans.

HOUSTON TO HEAR WALLACE

HOUSTON, Sept. 22—(AP)—Former Vice President Henry A. Wallace may speak here November 12.

Virgil Arnold, Houston attorney and former president of the Age Limit League of America, Inc., said he had received a letter of acceptance from Wallace to appear here on that date. Arnold said a huge mass meeting would be called. Senator Claude Pepper of Florida was invited, too, Arnold said, but he has made no acceptance so far.

Reorganization of Alumni Staff Approved by Former Students

Plans for a reorganization of personnel of the Association of Former Students to permit Executive Secretary E. E. McQuillen to assume other duties were approved by the Council of the Association meeting at College Station Saturday night. McQuillen is expected to be named Director of the Development Fund succeeding Henderson Shuffler, when the reorganization is completed.

In accepting McQuillen's retirement, the council expressed its appreciation of his long record of service by a standing tribute of applause. Tributes were paid McQuillen by Former Senator Penrose B. Metcalfe of San Angelo, and J. P. Hamblen, former president of the association.

The main feature of the new budget was the establishment of a Former Students' Opportunity Award Scholarship Endowment. In addition, it allotted \$2,500 to furnish the Cadet Corps with new colors and standards, and sufficient funds required to operate the Association office. Stricken from the original budget, recommended by the executive board of the council, were two objectives which the councilmen considered out of their realm of duty to the college. One of these objectives was a provision to supply modern teaching aids and mechanical devices for the English and speech departments in the amount of \$10,000. The other item which failed to receive approval was one which would establish a microfilm library and projector in the college library for the use of graduate students.

Davenport Wins First Quarterback Guessing Contest

T. A. Davenport won the Battalion Arm-Chair Quarterback contest for last Saturday's football games with a perfect, four for four calling, on Southwest games. Davenport, residence listed as Room 74, Leggett Hall, picked correctly the victories of Texas A&M, Texas and Arkansas over T.C.U.'s tie with Kansas. The prize, two tickets to Saturday's game with Texas Tech, will be presented to Davenport by the Battalion at Thursday's meeting of the A&M Quarterback Club at 7:30 p.m. in the Assembly Hall. Davenport's predictions with the actual scores in parenthesis were: A&M over Southwestern 40-0 (48-0); Texas over Texas Tech 27-0 (33-0); Arkansas over N.C.U. Louisiana 47-0 (64-0); and T.C.U. to tie Kansas 13-13 (0-0).

Veterans who entered schools and colleges this fall may expect their first subsistence check early in November, the Veterans Administration has announced. The initial payment will include all subsistence allowances due from the start of the semester through the end of the last full subsistence period before the check is issued.

New Leave Policy Inaugurated by VA For College GI's

A new policy has been inaugurated by the Veterans Administration regarding absence, and leave of absence of veterans while in college under Public Law 346, the G. I. Bill of Rights. The new policy will eliminate all requirements for reports of absences of veterans to the VA. However, when the veteran drops out of college, or is absent to such an extent that his conduct and progress are no longer satisfactory, a report must be submitted. In effect, the new policy will entitle a veteran for up to 15 days of any period between consecutive semesters or quarters. Where the period between semesters or quarters (including summer sessions) is longer than 15 days, or where it is shorter than 15 days and the veteran does not re-enroll for the following semester subsistence continues for 15 days, and then stops. It will be continued when the veteran re-enrolls. No other leave will be granted.
