Lipscomb's Pharmacy, Madeley Pharmacy, and Sbis Hall are the cleanest eating establishments in College Station, according to the monthly inspections conducted by a county health officer, a representative of the college, and representative of the Veteran Students Association, Marvin Kuers.

Drug stores and restaurants, graded separately, were inspected each month at unannounced times, and results were figured on a basis of 100%. Eateries receiving less than 70% in most cases had their permits revoked until clean-up processes could be undertaken.

In the drug store category, Lipscomb's and Madeley tied for first place with grades of 92%. In the restaurant field, Sbis Hall rated first, with a score of 90%.

Booby prize-winner for drug stores went to Black's Pharmacy, which racked up 79 points. Whereas, the A. & M. Grill just passed with a score of 71 in the restaurant group.

On page 1 are printed monthly scores from September, 1946 through August, 1947. The last column contains the average percentage for that period of time.

Persons should remember that grades are based on 100% percentage, with all scores below 70% failing.

ment. One lot is a check lot being fed grain sorghum, cottonseed meal, and alfalfa hay. The other three lots of steers get the same total amount of hay and concentrates as the steers in the check lot. However, in the grain ration, two, three, and four pounds of grain is replaced with an equal amount of citrus molasses for the steers in lots two, three, and four, respectively. In addition, all steers have access to liberal amounts of mixed minerals and salt.

Results of the experiment to date have been satisfactory, according to Riggs.
