Luck, Spirit, And Plenty Of Passing Needed If Aggies To Have Chance Against Sooners

"We're going to have to play hard, heads-up football and hit a couple of key passes to have a chance Saturday." That's the way Coach Homer Norton summed up the Aggies chances against Oklahoma's power-laden Sooners when the two clubs clash in Norman Saturday before some 30,000 Okies.

"They're big, they're fast, they're rugged and they're good and we're going to have to hold on to the ball most of the time to have any chance at all."

All of which adds up to the Aggies' toughest assignment by far of the young season and a lot of hard work by the team before they entrain for Sooner land Thursday night.

The Sooners employ what is known as the "Missouri T", a variation of the "T" formation designed for a running game. And power on the ground is exactly what Oklahoma has. They scored 24 points against a good Detroit eleven last week utilizing that power and from all appearances, they don't even miss high-scoring Junior Golding, despite the mounting of Sooner coach Bud Wilkinson to the contrary.

"That T of Oklahoma's puts three men in a position to carry the ball," Norton explained, "and you've got to TRY to watch all three of them."

Even the most casual observer could see that the Aggie mentor wasn't exactly looking forward to Saturday's game.

Squad In Good Physical Shape With No New Injuries Reported; Drill Against O.U. "T"

The Cadets came out of the Tech game in good shape with no new injuries reported. Pee Wee Smith is slowly rounding into shape and should be in top condition for the L. S. U. game and may even get into the O. U. contest.

No new changes in the starting lineup resulted from the performance in the Tech game. Incidentally, needless to say, Norton was pleased with his team's performance against the Raiders.

"The boys were foaming at the mouth, and when a team is like that, they're awfully hard to beat. That's what we've got to try to do this coming Saturday—make up what we lack in size, speed and ability with spirit, hustle and determination to win. If we do that, we've got a chance."

The Aggies worked long hours Tuesday in blocking and tackling drills, and wound up under the lights drilling against Oklahoma's "T". Sandwiched in between, Cashion, Hollmig and Bazy tested their passing arms, which figure to be in for heavy duty Saturday.

Norton plans more heavy duty today with the squad tapering off Thursday with long defensive drills and blocking and tackling.

The team, leaving College Thursday night, will arrive at Oklahoma City around noon Friday and will workout Friday afternoon.

Goode of Aggies Leads Conference With Punt Return Average of 34 Yds.

DALLAS, Oct. 1 (AP)—That iron-bound Arkansas defense that sent the Razorbacks to the Cotton Bowl last season is still at work. But the Porkers also have moved out offensively this year.

Statistics on Southwest Conference football released today by James H. Stewart, Conference Secretary, show Arkansas to have allowed only 154 yards rushing and passing in their two games. This is 30 yards better than given up by Texas Christian, second defensively in the conference.

Arkansas has rolled up 776 yards rushing and passing to lead the offense. Texas, in second place, is 15 yards behind Arkansas.

Little Ken Holland has contributed 250 Arkansas yards on the ground as leading ball-carrier of the conference. Byron Gillory of Texas is second with 168.

Bobby Layne of Texas tops in passing with 11 completions in 17 attempts for 207 yards; J. D. Ison of Baylor leads in pass-receiving, having taken five for 98 yards; Leon Jolin of Texas Christian is the leading punter with an average of 58.5 on two kicks, with Stan Hollmig of Texas A&M second with 47.2 on seven boots, and Bob Goode of A&M leads in punt returns with 102 yards on three run-backs for an average of 34.0.

Odessa received 36 first place votes and Wichita Falls seven. The remaining eight positions in the weekly poll for the best ten went to Corpus Christi, Austin, Waxahachie and Brackenridge (San Antonio) tied for fifth, Longview, North Side (Pt. Worth), Amarillo and Thomas Jefferson (San Antonio).

SWC FRAMES PRACTICE

Boxing Commission Bars Graziano In III.

CHICAGO, Oct. 1 (AP)—The Illinois Athletic Commission yesterday barred dishonorably discharged serviceman from boxing in Illinois in an order which Roy D. Kechn, commission member, said referred to Rocky Graziano, midweight champion.

Kechn said the commission had accepted the War Department's record of Pvt. Rocco Barbella as that of Graziano. That record showed Barbella was convicted, sentenced and dishonorably discharged from the army on a charge of being absent without leave in 1942.

"Graziano's application for a permit to fight Tony Zale here last July 16 was signed by both names—Rocco Barbella and Rocky Graziano," Kechn declared.
