WOULD BAR RUSSIANS WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)-Senator Knowland (R-Calif.) urg-ed President Truman to limit Rus-bian citizens allowed to enter the United States to the same number of Americans permitted entry in-to the Soviet Union. Platt is a Carnegie Tech grad-uate who has spent five years in the field research laboratories of Magnolia Petroleum and Socony-Vacuum companies.
