Deadline for Six Positions Of VSA Extended to Tuesday

Deadline for candidates to file for one of the six offices of the Veterans Students Association has been extended until 5 p. m. Tuesday, October 7, Grady Elms, club advisor, stated yesterday.

In extending the deadline, taking place on the campus at the same time was proving quite complicated and confusing.

Elms stated that two elections of the six positions should file at the office of Student Activities before 5 p. m. Tuesday. Offices to be filled are president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, parliamentarian, and sergeant-at-arms.

Ballots will be conducted through the dormitories by house-masters, similar to the campus-wide election now underway. Ballots for non-dormitory veterans students will also be run in the Battalion for the six positions.

Representatives of the VSA will not be elected this semester as the new student government set-up will off-set this former council.

A VSA constitutional amendment has been proposed and will be voted upon as soon as the club is re-organized this semester.

Club Column To Carry Notices Of Future Meetings

Because of the great number of club notices coming to the Battalion, it becomes necessary to establish a special column in which all notices will appear.

Though called "What's Cooking" this column will differ from the column of that name previously carried by the Battalion, in that club meetings will be listed alphabetically by name, rather than by time, as was done before.

The first column will appear next week. Items of special interest, such as the results of club elections, will still be carried in the news columns.

Club notices should be in the office of the Battalion before 5 o'clock of the night before the issue in which publication is desired.

To keep up with events, it is suggested that all students scan the list of meetings daily.

Annex Apartments Are Available For Vets and Non-Vets

Quarters for married veterans and non-veterans are available at the A. & M. Annex, the Housing Office announced Wednesday.

The apartments are those used by bachelor officers stationed at the field during the war. Rent is \$12 per month.

Each apartment consists of three rooms, including two bedrooms and a sitting room. Although cooking facilities have not been installed, hot plates are allowed, and can be used in the sitting room.

Furnishings include one dinette suite, a chest of drawers, tables, and dormitory cots and chairs. An icebox can be obtained from the college for \$1 a month extra.

Warmth for the quarters is supplied by a large space-heater in the sitting room. The size of the apartment will permit no other gas heating elements, but electric heating units may be used.

All showers and toilet facilities are outside, the Housing Office pointed out. There is no running water in the apartments.

Placement & Personnel Service Available to Prospective Grads

For all men on the last go-round at A. & M. — seniors, that is—there exists on the campus an organization designed to help them in facing the cold cruel world. The office of Placement and Personnel Relations, Room 230, Administration Building, serves that purpose.

Over 3,000 firms maintain contact with the Placement Office. Each has at one time or another filled the office for seniors to fill positions of various types. No executive positions paying \$25,000 a year are open, but the office can place ambitious, hard-working, industrious young men in respectable positions.

Throughout the year representatives from various industries arrive on the campus to interview job applicants. No warnings are given the seniors several days in advance of arrival, because in 1939 three sophomores grabbed a representative and subjected him to all manner of indignities before they found he was not a freshman.

The purpose of the office, which cooperates closely with the faculty of the college, is to assist senior students and alumni with employment matters. There is no charge for the service, but unless a complete registration record is filed with the office, proper credentials cannot be presented to company representatives requesting information.

In order to facilitate its work, the office maintains a complete record of each man registered. When representatives of business and industry visit the campus, Wendell R. Horsley, Director of the Placement Office, and Lucian B. Morgan, Assistant Director, arrange interviews for the students.

To receive full benefits from the Placement Office, seniors who plan to graduate in January, June, July or August are urged to do the following as soon as possible:

- 1. File a registration record with the Placement Office.
2. Order a set of personnel leaflets when filing for registration record.
3. Discuss employment matters with your major department head and the Placement Office.
4. Finally, seniors are urged to watch their departmental bulletin boards for employment notices.

Recess appointments in the Regular Army are scheduled to be presented to the President of the United States on October 10, 1947. Present indications are that those lists of officers to be appointed in the Regular Army will contain approximately 4,200 nominations allocated as follows: 4,000 Air Corps; 500 Ground Forces; 1500 Service Forces.

A system of final processing for these successive applicants has been set up by the Army Commanders concerned. Appointment lists will be dispatched by officer courier from Washington, D. C. to Army Headquarters from which point telegraphic information will be relayed to officers concerned. Every effort will be made to have the appointment list published before their presentation to the President.

Further information may be secured from the Executive Officer, Military Science Department, Ross Hall.

Harvard Man Joins Architecture Dept

William E. Allen Jr. has been named assistant professor of architecture of Texas A. & M. College, according to Mr. Earnest Langford, head of the architecture department.

Allen received his bachelor of architecture degree from the Carnegie Institute of Technology in 1934, and his master of architecture degree from Harvard in 1947. Allen was born in Muskogee, Oklahoma; is 36 years old, married and has a young son, aged three. Mr. Allen served in the army for a period of two years, over a year of which was spent as a flight instructor. He has had nine years of general office practice in Dallas and in Ocean Springs, Mississippi.

The new assistant professor will be in charge of the design program in fourth year architecture.

In the case of electing members to the Student Life Committee, the four men receiving the highest number of votes will be the final selections. The next four highest men in that race will be alternates in case any of the duly-elected members drop from school or graduate at mid-term. The one man receiving the highest number of votes in the Athletic Council race will be the final choice. The next highest man will serve as his alternate if he should resign from school or graduate. The same procedure will apply to all dormitory and area representatives, with the second man in each group as alternate. There will be no run-off elections in case one man in any race does not receive a majority of votes cast.

Two additions to the engineering faculty were announced today. W. H. Alexander Jr. has resigned from the U. S.
