

## Diving Coach Is Added to Aggie Athletic Staff

Emil Mamaliga has been appointed to the A. & M. coaching staff as diving coach, it was announced yesterday.

Mamaliga hails from Canton, Ohio and is a graduate of Ohio State University graduating in 1943 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education.

He won varsity letters on the Ohio State swimming teams of 1941-42-43 and placed second in the 200 yard breaststroke at the Big Ten Meet in 1942, placed third at the '43 meet, and took fifth in the 1943 National Collegiate Swimming Meet.

His coach at Ohio State was Mike Peppe who is recognized as the best diving coach in the world today and has been appointed diving coach of the U. S. Olympic Team. Peppe has the very highest praise for Mamaliga and says that he should make one of the best coaches in the country.

After graduating from Ohio State, Mamaliga coached at University High School, Columbus, Ohio until April, 1943 when he

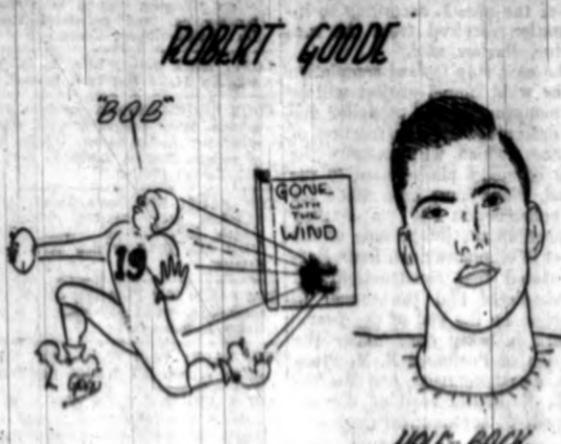

## MacPhail-Durocher Baseball Puzzle

NEW YORK, Oct. 8 (AP)—The two big questions remaining in the wake of the 1947 World Series today revolved about that old Damon and Pythias combination, Larry MacPhail and Leo Durocher:

1. Will MacPhail's resignation as president of the Yankees, dramatically announced by MacPhail himself in the clubhouse at the end of yesterday's game, stick, or will he remain with the club in an advisory capacity.

2. What's to become of Leonine Leo, now that his suspension as manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers is supposed to be at an end.

Some insiders insisted that Branch Rickey, who succeeded MacPhail as president of the Dodgers, would announce his decision regarding Durocher's status at the conclusion of the series.

Rickey's reply to reporters' questions was simply "Durocher was suspended by Mr. Chandler. We are waiting for an official announcement from the commissioner."

## Aggies Have Light Practice Session Wednesday Night

Only a light scrimmage was in store for the Texas Aggies on the Kyle Field practice area Wednesday afternoon, as the varsity met the "B" team, minus shoulder pads but wearing plastic helmets.

Johmie Frankie's "B" Squad ran through a number of plays that the Aggies could expect from the LSU Tigers Saturday night, against each of the varsity squads in succession. Only check blocking was used, no tackling was allowed, but the team did stress pass defense and anything went there.

"We figured on taking it easy tonight," Coach Norton said. "We don't want to risk any new injuries this close to conference schedule and several of the boys have colds. This workout was primarily to keep everyone in shape."

The team leaves tonight on the southbound Sunbeam after an hour's workout in the afternoon. Friday afternoon, they will undergo another light scrimmage in Baton Rouge, mainly to keep the squad in shape. Coach Norton expressed the opinion that since the team was playing at night this week that the reserves might hold up better than at Oklahoma.

George Kadera is again working with the team but will probably be saved for the TCU tilt, a week from now. Odell Stautzenberger, Jim Winkler, Red Overly, and Bob Goode are all hampered by "dust" colds.

## Farmers Definite Underdogs Against Potent Tigers; 37 Aggies Make Trip

Thirty-seven Aggie footballers plus coaches, trainers and managers will leave Aggiland tonight at 7:54 on the South bound Sunbeam for Baton Rouge, La., where they will tangle with the powerful LSU Tigers Saturday night.

Out-manned by Oklahoma U. last week, the Aggies will face a still more potent football foe in Louisiana State.

"We'll show up for the ball game and shoot the works," Aggie Head Coach Homer Norton stated Tuesday, "but I'm afraid we won't make a very loud pop against LSU. They are four and five deep in every position."

"We just didn't have enough capable reserves, and we don't have them in quantity now," Norton stated.

Added to Norton's woes are two injuries in the previous reserve ranks. Bobby Goff, left half, is out with an injured kidney and George Kadera, the promising 215-pound fullback from Houston, has a chipped bone in his ankle. Neither played against Oklahoma and they may not be ready until the Aggie Southwest Conference opener with Texas Christian in Fort Worth, Oct. 18.

The starting line-up against LSU will depend on whether the Aggies kick or receive. If they kick, Bob Dew will replace James Cassion at quarter and Joe Sacra, formerly a guard, will be in for Bob Tullis at left tackle.

The rest of the line-up will consist of Bob Goode at right half, Barney Welch at left half and Ed Dusek at full.

In the line will be Bob Gary at center, Odell Stautzenberger and Charles Overly at guards, Jim Winkler at right tackle, and Norton Higgins and Cotton Howell at ends.

The remainder of the Aggie squad making the trip to Baton Rouge are: ends, Pollock, Propok, Whittaker and Wright; tackles, Hook, Routt, and Setogast; guards, Bennett, Dupree, Greiner, and Turley; centers, Ellis and Guly; backs, Anderson Ballentine, Baly, Burditt, Daniel, Green, Halliday, Hollmig, Kadera, Smith, and Yates.
