J. E. Roberts and Mrs. J. D. Prewitt are co-chairmen of the College Employees Dinner Club.

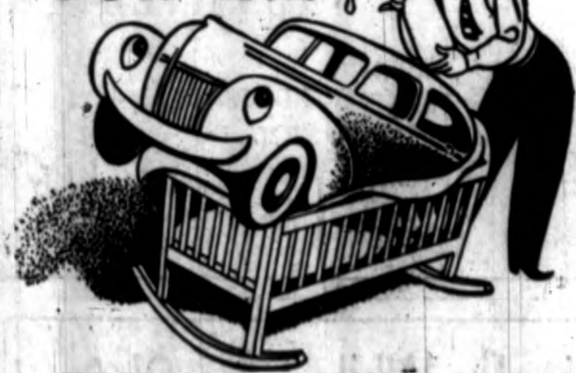
Agronomy Society To Revise Charter
