

Voldu to Be Presented On A&M Campus

Founder To Give Lecture Tuesday

"Voldu" will be presented for the first time on the A. & M. campus Tuesday at 4 p. m., when Dr. Josef Stadelmann, founder of this new international language, presents a lecture in Room 125, Academic Building.
Dr. Stadelmann, a member of the modern language department, formed "Voldu" after making a

studied criticism of its international forerunners, especially Esperanto. It does not pretend to displace national idioms deeply rooted in the affections of all peoples but to provide an auxiliary tongue for common communication, according to Dr. Stadelmann.

English, the most used language internationally, provides the base for "Voldu," but has been purged of irregularities and other handicaps to its widespread adoption. "Thus based on a living tongue," states Dr. Stadelmann, "Voldu" should be exempted from the reproach frequently made of artificially fabricated languages, namely, that they are unable to render certain things connected with style, intimacy, and poetic sensibility.

In addition to the advantage of being naturally born, "Voldu" is simplified (into 12 lessons), is logical, reformed completely in spelling, and cleaned of certain phonetical deficiencies that make

English inaccessible, even in its simplest form to millions of people not brought up with it.
The language has already achieved international prominence. Some sixty libraries in twenty-three countries have works on it.
Dr. Stadelmann came to A. & M. this semester from Denver University where he taught German and Russian. He has studied at the University of Tuebingen in Germany, the Sorbonne in Paris, and the University of Munich.

Veterinarians On Trip to Ft. Worth

Dr. F. P. Jaggi, head of the department of veterinary hygiene, left today with the 49 senior veterinary medicine students of his V. H. 492 class for an inspection trip to Fort Worth.
The tour, conducted by Fort Worth city veterinary inspectors, will include the Swift, Armour, Bluebonnet, Rosenthal, and City packing plants; the Globe Laboratories; and various creameries and dairies. The class will be gone Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of this week.

According to Dr. Jaggi, the purpose of the trip, "is to give the men first hand information on inspection methods and to acquaint them with the general operation of these establishments." At Globe Laboratories the class will see commercial methods of preparing biologicals, Dr. Jaggi stated.

The award will be made to the bidder for the lowest and best bid, subject to the approval of the City Council and the City Engineer.

The successful bidder will be required to enter into a contract with the City of College Station, Texas, within ten days after the date of the award. The City Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
