"Facts are the greatest raw materials in the world," according to G. Ray Martin, business consultant with the U. S. Department of Commerce, who interviewed students at the Placement Office Friday afternoon.

Anyone who has entertained himself with dreams of a business of his own should look into the display of literature at the placement office, made available by the department of commerce, through the recent visit of Martin.

There is a series of booklets to answer the need for sound and useful information on establishing and operating many kinds of small businesses. The facts they contain are current and fundamental.

Some of the ideas and information available through the public service and publications of the department of commerce would be difficult to obtain elsewhere; often being considered trade secrets by those in the business about which information is being sought.

The placement office display contains bibliographies of hundreds of useful business publications, and order blanks for their procurement.

The final event was, as always, the Brahma Bull riding, perennially the roughest and most dangerous of rodeo events. Running true to form, the event ended with almost as many injuries as rides. Dr. Schrode, the rodeoing prof of the A. H. department was one of the pre-performance favorites, and proved no disappointment in his riding ability, but the bull he drew evidently never read his press notices.

He rode the big square bull the full time limit and then some before looking for a convenient place to abandon his mount, but as he leaped off, he accidentally tripped, fell, and the bull whirled and charged him. The Brahma passed over him in a cloud of dust and a tangle of arms and legs, to the accompaniment of screams from the stands. As the bull was lured away, and the stretcher bearers grabbed their litters, the good doctor calmly got up, dusted himself off, and walked away mentally adding up his points toward top money.

When the stock were driven back to the pens, the rigging carefully collected, and the arena lights went out, there were two thoughts in everyone's mind, first that it was a rodeo to be proud of in a state famed for its contests, and secondly that next year's version would be bigger, rougher, and better. In the words of Bob Crosby, one of the states real old timers and top hands, "You can quit drinking, and you can give up smoking, but once you've started rodeoin', you've got a lifetime habit!"

Year's First Cadet Corps Review to Be Held Wednesday, Infantry Drill Field

The first Cadet Corps review of the year will be held on the Infantry Drill Field behind Duncan Hall at 5 p. m. Wednesday according to an announcement by Colonel of the Corps William L. Brown.

This review will be held in preparation for the Thanksgiving Review which will take place during the week of the A&M-Texas U. football game, which due to the annual Thanksgiving Bonfire, will be held on the Infantry Drill Field in place of the accustomed Field Artillery Drill Field, Brown further stated.

The Corps will form in front of their dorms and march down Throckmorton Street toward College Park, forming with companies, Battalions and Regiments in line facing east toward the Houston highway.

The reviewing stand will be located directly south of Duncan Hall and facing west toward Kyle Field. The Corps will march past the reviewing stand accompanied by the composite band and continue up the route of approach. Guidons, colors, and sabers will be carried, and the official uniform will be number two, khaki with ties.

All commissioned cadet officers will wear white gloves, which can be purchased at the Exchange Store.
