

Membership Drive


A membership drive for members of the Pre-Law Society was initia-ted Monday at a meeting held in Building K, C. P. McKnight, club


president, announced yesterday. Postcards will be mailed to all pre-law students and a desk will be maintained in the Academic Building to contact other students interested.


McKnight stated that a "smok-er" would be held in the YMCA lounge on the second floor Tues-day night after yell practice.


