Deans of Men At Dallas Convention

Dean of Men W. L. Penberthy and assistants W. G. Bronzono and Bob Murray left yesterday afternoon to attend a meeting of the Texas Association of Deans and Advisors of Men today and tomorrow at the Baker Hotel in Dallas. Arno Nowotny, dean of student life at the University of Texas, will be one of the principal speakers. Dean Nowotny, past president of the association and of the national association, will tell his ideas for making the Texas council as successful as the national group. Other speakers will be Dean Willis M. Tate of SMU, who will discuss "Trends in Higher Education and Their Effects on the Office of Dean of Men," and Dean J. E. Williamson of the University of Houston, who will talk on "The Place of Moral Discipline in College." Charles V. Dunham, dean of men at Texas University and vice-president of the association, will preside.
