 Starting from the 20 on the touchback, the Mustangs rolled 80 yards to set up the game. Again it was Johnson, this time connecting on seven of eight tosses, who carried the brunt of the SMU offensive load with a sideline shot to Raleigh Blackley covering the final 16 yards.  
 Fine defensive play on the part of the three sets of Aggie ends, Howell and Higgins, Pollock and Prokop, and Whittaker and Wright, kept the touted Walker pretty well bottled up throughout the game but there was no stopping this Johnson who made the Southwest fans remember the days of Slingin' Sammy Baugh at his best.  
 Jim Winkler and Odell Stautzenberger shone in the center of the Aggie forward wall along with Bob Tulla, Red Overly, Joe Sacra and Bob Gary. The line played one of its best games of the year against the vaunted Pony ground team.  
 Hollmig continued his brilliant kicking, averaging 44.5 yards on six boots, one just missed the red flag for what would have been a 64-yard punt.
