# Game Associations Promoting Wildlife Conservation - Taylor

That local game associations have outstanding opportunities to promote conservation of wildlife in their respective areas was the word brought back to College Station by Walter P. Taylor, Leader, Texas Cooperative Wildlife Unit, from Wichita Falls last week.

Dr. Taylor was in Wichita Falls as principal speaker at the annual banquet of the Wichita Falls Field and Stream Association, his subject being "Some Problems of Texas Sportsmen."

A feature of the banquet was a meal of fish, antelope, venison (from Colorado), bear, and elk. Among the 250 persons present and taking part in the meeting were members of the legislature and the federal Congress, and community leaders.

Ed Bonn, biologist for the area, and a graduate of A. & M.'s Department of Fish and Game, showed a motion picture indicating progress with plantings for waterfowl in lakes in the vicinity of Wichita Falls, and also the work being done by 4-H Club boys in improving conditions for bobwhite quail.

Some three hundred and fifty dollars in prizes were awarded to 4-H Club boys for planting quail foods, under protection from livestock, erection of shelters and headquarters areas for quail, and advancement of wildlife conservation generally in the vicinity.

Among the speakers in addition to Dr. Taylor and Bonn were former State Senator Ben G. O'Neal, who presided at the meeting, Irvin J. Vogel, president of the association, and State Senator George Moffitt, a graduate of A. & M.

## '43 Graduate Joins Architect Faculty

Charles H. Neuhardt, A. & M. graduate of September, 1943, has joined the department of architecture as assistant professor.
