"What a life for the female element!" says Molly Bowser, principal character in this new Caldwell novel. And Molly Bowser says it with good reason, for this wonderfully funny and tragically real character has a pretty tough time with her life. Happiness, security, love are forever eluding her—often by the narrowest margins.

Molly is newly married, but even more newly widowed as the story opens. Fat, funny, thirty-five, pathetic, but practical, Molly had married Putt thinking he could at least tide things over until she had her sixteen-year-old daughter Lilly respectfully wedded.

Apart from her devotion to her daughter, Molly finds consolation in two ways, drinking red wine—she usually has several tumblers before breakfast—and taking vitamin shots, a good shot of vitamins usually gets Molly over her worst fits of depression.

So Molly makes her plans and very nearly succeeds in capturing for Lilly, Claude Stevens, who works in the bank. But the lives of Molly and Lilly are complicated by the youngster's next door, Perry Trotter, who falls in love with Lilly, and by Putt's brother Fethro who moves in on them. Also by the land lord wanting his rent.

Molly's only friend in town, not counting several male admirers, is the preacher's wife Christine, who is very fond of vitamin shots, and calls on Molly to spend the day with her whenever the preacher—husband leaves town.

All in all Molly has a hard time, but she manages. And if things grow progressively worse, and she can't accept each hazard too happily, at least she takes everything philosophically. In the working out of her fate Molly sees "the sure hand of God."

man, but he may materially aid the sales manager in the organization of the sales department and in the establishment of sales quotas. Of course the accountant must set up the general accounting system for the business. This entails the setting-up of a training program and procedures for office personnel.

Several months after the business has begun to operate, accountants will be able to revise the original budget to a variable budget basis.

Heinen stressed that engineers and management should consult the accountant when changes occur in order to better economize the operation of the business.

In closing Heinen touched lightly on the accountant's role in the establishment of adequate com-
