must know how to transfer this subject matter; and after having done this, he must know how to appraise this knowledge in the students. Just as have experiments in the various sciences proved one thing to be superior to another, so have experiments in the fields of education and psychology proved certain methods of teaching and testing to be superior to others.

My point is this: Why should teaching requirements and licensing be limited to elementary and secondary schools? Why should it not be required of college teachers also?

Surely the basic principles of education are as valid in college teaching as in public school teaching. One still works with personalities.

It seems that remedial work needs to be done on the part of the teachers as well as on the part of students.

## Aggie to Preside At Presbyterian Parley in Sherman

Tommy Gould, A&M student from Wichita Falls, will preside over the Presbyterian Students Association's three-day annual convention, which will be held in Sherman, Texas November 21-23.

Two hundred students, representing colleges and universities in Texas and Oklahoma, will be guests of Austin College and the Presbyterian Churches of Sherman.

Featured on the program will be Dr. Frank Caldwell, president of the Louisville Presbyterian Seminary, Louisville, Ky., who will deliver a series of four talks on Friday night, Nov. 21, and Saturday, November 22.

Convention delegates will be entertained Friday night at a banquet, followed by Dr. Caldwell's first lecture at the First Presbyterian Church and a social program at the municipal auditorium. Saturday sessions will be held at the Grand Avenue Presbyterian Church adjacent to the Austin College campus.

Other officers of the association are Earl Wiggins, Van Alstyne, student at Texas Theological Seminary, Austin, vice-president; and Miss Jackie Lewis, Lubbock, Texas Tech student, secretary.

Arrangements for the convention are being directed by Miss Betty Birk, Iowa Park, Chairman of the Austin College committee, and Shirley Gutherie, Kilgore, chairman of the Austin College Westminster Fellowship, assisted by Presbyterian pastors and college officials.

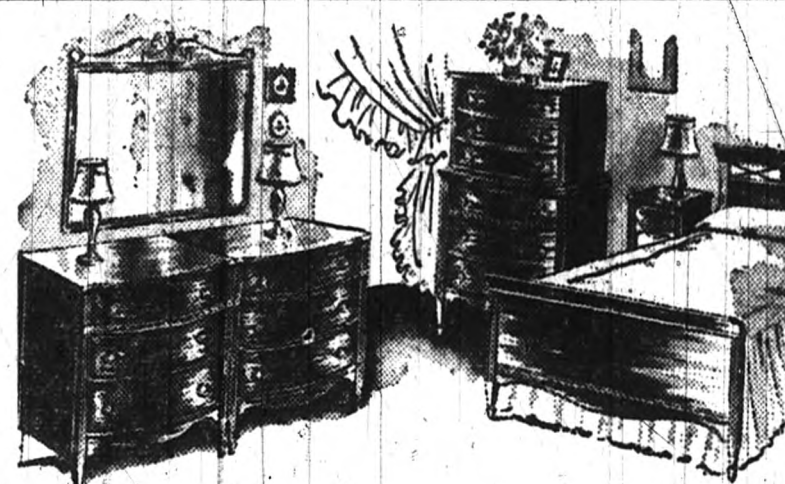
