tioned by institutions of higher learning.

First, let us admit that knowledge of the subject is not the only requirement for the successful professor. He must be able to get his message across to men who quite frequently are bewildered by the apparent scope of an unfamiliar subject. This requires an understanding of the student mind, it is true, but this understanding may not come from years of experience, and it may not come from memories fresh in the mind of the student instructor. It should come, however, from the knowledge of how much of the present course the student is getting and retaining.

Therefore, why not student surveys? Not only ask the student what he thinks of his professors, but give spot checks on knowledge of the course possessed by students in the upper, medium, and lower levels of a professor's class. Surprise oral quizzes by department heads or their designated as-

stants would serve this purpose.

And what about a study of desirable teaching methods by a committee made up of professors from the various departments working in conjunction with someone from the psychology department? Studies made during the war of training methods used in industry were found to be quite helpful to experienced and inexperienced instructors alike.

I do not believe there are any men employed by the college as instructors or professors who would not be glad to improve their teaching methods if shown the way. I will admit that some of the older professors might be surprised and hurt if it were pointed out that their methods were inferior, but surely a tactful and intelligent person could make them realize that the best of men can occasionally go stale.

If these steps were coupled with a survey of the professors as to their idea of the recommended study methods to be used for various courses, I cannot help but believe that we all might profit by learning more with less effort.
