Vestal to Speak Before T.S.P.E.

Donald M. Vestal, Jr., will speak to the Brazos Chapter of T.S.P.E. on "Heat Pump Research" Monday November 24, at 7:30 p. m. in the Electrical Engineering lecture room. Engineers, faculty, and students of this area are invited to hear him.

Mr. Vestal is from Ft. Worth and graduated from A. & M. in 1938 with a degree in Mechanical Engineering and Electrical Engineering. He was a military government officer of the U. S. Army from 1941 to 1946. He worked for Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corp from 1946 to February, 1947. Then he became Research Engineer for the Engineering Experiment Station in charge of Reverse Cycle Heating Projects for the Texas A. & M. Research Foundation.

Peyton McKnight, 22-year-old senior history major from Quitman, was elected president of the newly-created Student Arts and Sciences Council at a meeting yesterday in the Academic Building. McKnight is president of the Pre-Law Club.

Lockett, senior instructor, of Houston, explain the army's new career guidance plan at a meeting in the Chemistry Lecture room last night. The new plan is designed to allow rapid advancement of all qualified service personnel, it was explained.

Pre-Laws to Hear District Judge

District Judge W. S. Barron will speak before the Pre-Law Society in the Assembly Room of the YMCA Monday night at 7 p. m. His topic, "The Lawyer in a Crisis," gives a resume of the part taken by lawyers in local, state and national emergencies.

Judge Barron was reared in this vicinity; attended Allen Academy, and graduated from Sam Houston Teachers College. He served as Superintendent of Schools of Grimes County in 1916 and practiced law there.

In 1917 Barron came to Bryan and was later elected to the state legislature for three terms, serving as Speaker of the House during his last term. In 1940 he became District Judge with offices located in Bryan. He was instrumental in forming the South Central Texas Bar Association and is active in prominent law circles throughout this area.
