Ex Named to Post In Valley Project

Lloyd Hamilton, a graduate of A&M and the University of Colorado, has been designated as resident engineer of the United States section of the International Boundary & Water Commission, according to word received from the Laredo Office.

He and Commissioner L. M. Lawson have just conducted an inspection of the floodway system in the valley and checked the Falcon site, near the Skarr-Zapata County line, which has been approved by the Mexican and United States sections.

Hamilton, who will be in charge of preliminary work at the site, is 41 years old and was a captain of engineers in the Pacific area during World War II.

Commissions In Navy Supply Corps Offered Graduates

The US Navy has announced an opportunity for college graduates to obtain a commission in the Navy Supply Corps. Experience in handling finances, material procurement, and material records can be gained at the Navy Supply Corps School.

The young supply officer may be assigned to any one of the many types of duty; he may go to a combat ship, to a supply depot, or to a foreign country. Duties vary from the handling of funds as disbursing officer to supervision of warehousing facilities.

To qualify for the Navy Supply Corps the applicant must be a graduate of an accredited college or university (any degree is acceptable), a citizen between 21 and 25 years of age, mental, moral and professional fitness as well as aptitude for Naval Service must be established through interviews and college employment records.

Physically the applicant must be 66 inches tall with weight in proportion to height. Vision minimum is 8-20 in each eye correctable to 20-20, and normal color perception.

The monthly base pay of an ensign is \$180 plus rental and subsistence allowance, giving a total pay of \$246 if single or \$282 if married. In addition to this is the advantage of purchasing at near cost from Navy owned Commissary and Ship's Service Stores. Ensigns are also entitled to the best of medical and dental care. Retirement laws provide for retirement after 20 years at 50% of base pay and longevity.

The Japanese are alleged to have decapitated two of the Americans, who parachuted from their disabled plane near Okinawa in April, 1945.
