Military Walk **Converted** Into

A change in the traffic speed limit on parts of the campus and the conversion of Military Walk into a one-way street were made at a meeting of the campus traffic control committee Tuesday.

Under the new ruling the twenty mile per hour speed zone will be reduced to include only the central campus area. Previously the zone had included the area within Farm Highway 60, State Highway 6, old Highway 6, and Jersey Street.

To ease the traffic congestion on Military Walk, traffic will be permitted to travel only in one direction, north to south. It was also decided to permit angular parking on the west side for the street.


According to Dean F. C. Belton, chairman, the committee took these steps to allow a speedy, yet safe flow of traffic on the campus.

Options on Specific Seats May Be Obtained for 20 Years

A. & M.'s Kyle Field will boast Texas first double-decked football stadium with the addition 6,000 new seats, under a plan being launched by the Aggle Ex-Student Association and the Athletic Department. The stadium, shown above, is being financed under a 20-year seat option plan being offered fans who have for years encountered difficulties in securing seats for home games here.

+ seats with six, eight, ten or twelve seats per box will cost \$60 each. Although A. & M. men are being given first opportunity to subscribe for the new seats, other football fans and friends of the College will be welcomed as participants.

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Plans and designs for the new section were developed by Willard Simpson, consulting engineer of San Antonio, and College Architect Aych C. Baker, '21. Final details of the subscription plans were worked out by joint committees from the Athletic Council and the Association of Former Students. Approval of the plan and authority for the committee were prorided by action of the Council Association in September.

The option plan will be simple and with few restrictions. Options must be exercised not later than October first each year but option holders are not required to purchase tickets to hold their options, which can be transferred with the approval of the Athletic Department. Subscribers will be given their choice of seats in the upper deck or in the lower deck extension of the present stands.

The expanded stadium will see twenty rows added to the present stand on the west side between the 10 yard lines. Another twenty rows will be in a second deck. The huge modern press box will be at the top of the entire addition.
