AUSTIN, TEXAS, Dec. 4 (AP)—Texas Democrats are in "breathless open warfare" with the national party organization because of chairman J. Howard McGrath's position on the Landon issue. Gov. Beauford H. Jester yesterday disclosed he has written McGrath saying the national organization "and the administration will not receive the customary enthusiastic support" of Texas Democrats if it "continues to favor this invasion of state's rights and this new ideology of paramount Federal power."

More and Cheaper Pork Forecast . . . Feeding Thouracil to Swine May Cause Faster Fattening

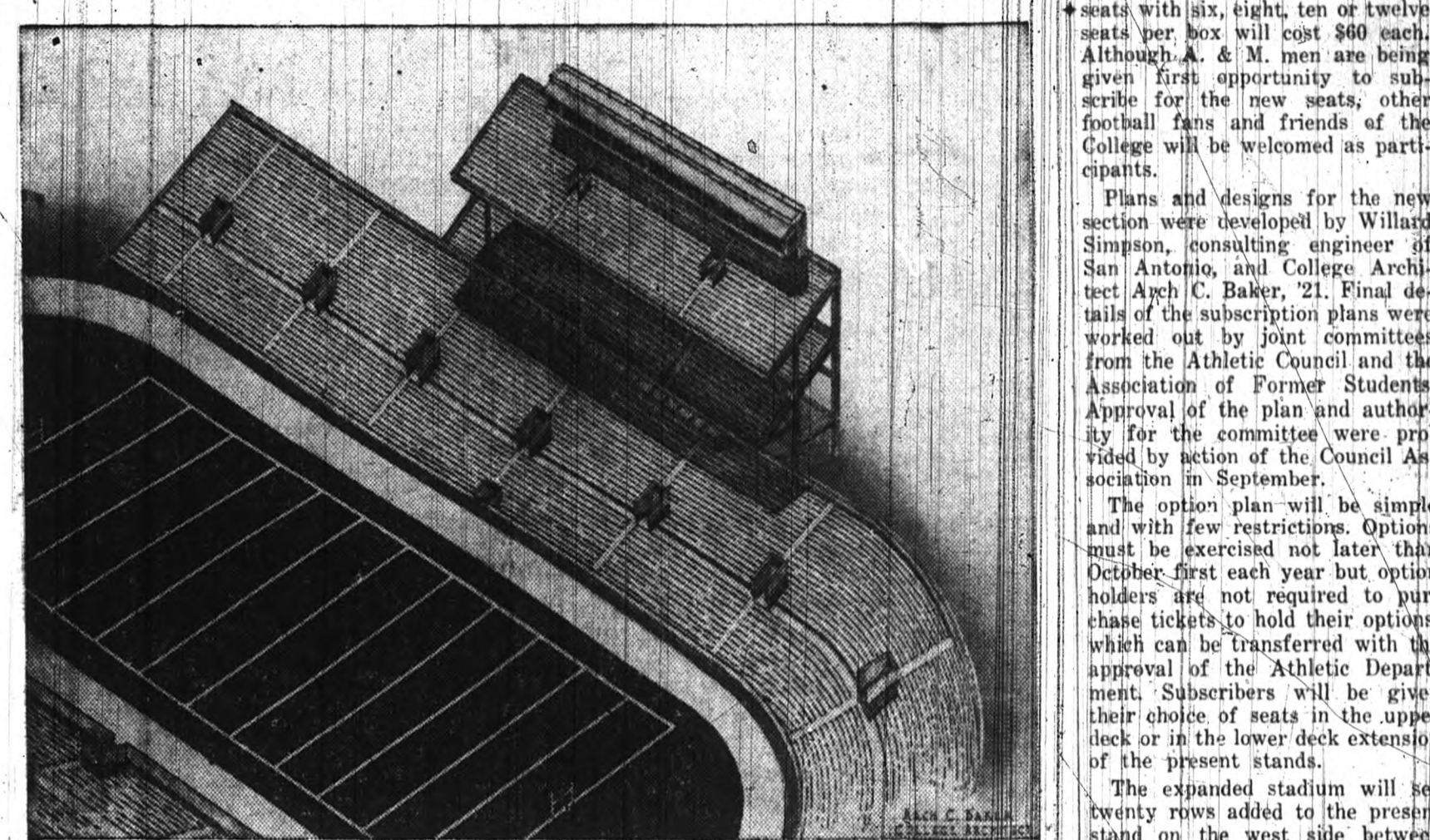
