## Club Reservations Crow Eradication Due Before Friday In Texas to Begin

Clubs and societies will have until Friday, December 12, to make reservations in the 1948 Longhorn Tommy John, co-editor of The Longhorn, said yesterday. The extension was granted because of a misunderstanding as to the allotment of space in the yearbook. Organizations may have either a full page for \$25 or one-third of a page for \$8.50, John said. The third of a page is to provide for the smaller clubs that are not able to pay for an entire page. However, only the officers of the club will be included in the pictures that occupy a third of a page, he said.

Any club or society that has reserved one-third of a page and wants a full page may make the proper arrangements at the Student Activities Office, any day this week.

Fred R. Brison of the horticulture department stated that the Texas Fish, Game and Oyster Commission has definite plans for the eradication of crows, a serious menace to Texas Pecan Growers. The work, to begin in the pecan areas of Texas as soon as the necessary supplies are obtained, will be similar to that used successfully in Oklahoma and other states. Dynamite will be set and exploded in areas where the crows roost. The people in these areas will not be notified of the time for they blast so as to prevent spectators which would scare the crows away and which would possibly cause an injury to a by-stander.

The damage done to pecans each year by crows, stated Brison, is almost inconceivable to the average person in Texas who is not connected with pecan growing. The crows have been particularly destructive to pecan crops this year since the crops are short and the prices are high. Thousands of crows in a grove at one time can do considerable damage. Agriculturists as well as pecan growers are anxious to cooperate in any way with the Texas Fish, Game and Oyster Commission in the crow eradication, Bryson said.

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## B&A Societies To Hear Consultant Monday Evening

"America's Greatest Economic Foundation: Small Business" will be discussed at a joint meeting of the Business and Accounting Societies December 8 at 7:30 p. m., in the Agricultural Engineering Lecture Room.

C. Ray Martin, business consultant of the United States Department of Commerce, Dallas Regional Office, will be the principal speaker.

Martin, educated in Texas schools, has served on the staff of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce as field representative. His business experience extends into both retail and wholesale merchandising activities and sales promotion work with several Texas firms.

During the early part of World War II, Martin served on the staff of the Business Education Division of the State Department of Vocational Education, disseminating information on government regulations to local business groups throughout Texas.

His federal service prior to his present position as field representative includes work with the Dallas Regional Office of the Smaller War Plants Corporation.
