

Aggie Cagers Drub Sam Houston 'kats Saturday; Return Match Slated Here Tuesday Night at 8

Outside Aid to Athletes in SWC Ag Soccer Club Prohibited by Faculty Group Beats Allen

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 15.—(AP)—The faculty committee of the Southwest Conference Saturday prohibited any form of outside aid to athletes.

The conference at its annual fall meeting unanimously agreed to this proposal and said it would include any outside jobs or other aid.

Executive Secretary James H. Stewart was empowered to investigate any reported violation of the new proposal and to make recommendations for penalties to the athlete and to the school.

Stewart said the amount of aid which now can be given an athlete is limited strictly to that provided by the school.

Under a conference ruling, which remains unchanged, school aid is limited to providing a job which will enable an athlete to pay for board, room, laundry and tuition.

The conference also:

1. Allowed for the formation of a five-man committee to study bowl games and distribution of bowl game receipts. This will include a study of whether the conference will limit bowl participation.

2. Voted to determine the team golf champion by round robin play.

3. Wiped off the last remaining wartime regulation which allowed

basketball teams to have more than 24 games scheduled in opponents over the 24-game limit were service teams.

4. Spring athletic events were awarded to:

Swimming, Texas A & M, College Station; Fencing—Texas, Austin; Cross-Country—Texas A&M and track and field—Rice, Houston. Date of the track and field meet was set as May 14-15.

Dean Robert A. Leflar, Arkansas, presided over the faculty meeting attended by D. W. Williams, Texas A&M, J. D. Bragg, Baylor, H. E. Bray, Rice, E. D. Mauzon Jr., Southern Methodist, Byron E. Short, Texas, and Dr. Henry Harth of Texas Christian.

In 1912, Hal Pumpelly made a 49-yard field goal to give Yale a 6-6 tie with Princeton. Helped by the wind, the ball barely grazed the crossbar.

A cold rain and a muddy field hampered the A&M Soccer Club yesterday as they downed Allen Academy 3-1. The game was played on the intramural football field behind the baseball diamond.

No score was made in the first 45-minute half, but the Aggies made a score early in the second period when Plinio Junquera took a pass from Dick Mendoza and kicked the ball through the uprights. Allen Academy then bounced back with a score by Duke on a pass from right center.

Both teams were unable to make a goal for the next 20 minutes as they see-sawed back and forth. An Allen man then fouled Dick Mendoza who promptly made a goal on a free shot.

Junquera scored again for the Aggie team in the last few minutes of play on a 25-yard kick which sailed in the upper right corner of the goal over the head of the Allen goalie.

The water-soaked ball held the Aggies back considerably in their second consecutive defeat of the Allen team. The Bulldog goalie also helped to stop several of the A&M scoring threats.

Farmers Show Improvement in First Out-of-Town Game; Final Score 65-55

An improved quintet of Aggie cagers dumped the Sam Houston Bearkats 65-55 in Huntsville in the first of a two-game series between the two teams.

The second tilt will be played here Tuesday night at 8 p. m.

Aggie Billy Turnbow and D. H. Watkins of Sam Houston shared high-point honors with 19 tallies each. There were few substitutions with only seven men on each side who took part in the contest.

A&M took a slight edge in the first half, losing the lead only twice and more often keeping four to six points in the lead. Two buckets and a charity by Mike Garcia and a charity by Gene Schriekel placed the Cadets nine points in the lead with three minutes left to go in the first stanza but, with the clock running out, Watkins and Don Walker of Sam Houston came alive and dropped three field goals and a charity through the hoop, the last bucket with five seconds of playing time remaining. The half-time gun sounded with A&M leading 31-29.

Immediately after the intermission, the Bearkats came back strong to rack up a bucket and two charities to take over the lead. A goal by Bill Batey, two by Turnbow, and two by Bob Kamperman put the visitors back in the run-

Improved Brand of Basketball Played By Aggie Cage Squad in 65-55 Victory

The Aggie cage squad ran into trouble Saturday night when they journeyed to Huntsville. This trouble was in the form of the tall, experienced Sam Houston Bearkats who made a game of it from start to finish, taking the ball away from the visitors time and again. Too, the Farmers missed eight charities which should have been part of the final score.

A better brand of basketball has been played, but should Marty Karow's changes continue to

play the kind of ball all season they did against the Bearkats, they will make themselves felt in SWC circles. In this column, we need not laud the Aggies for a performance exemplified in the figures:

Against the Abilene Christian College here December 1, the Aggies turned in a pretty nice game. Twenty-six field goals were made in 64 shots at the bucket. Free throws were 11 of 24. A slump was seen in the first of the two-game series with the visiting Southeastern Oklahoma Teachers. Even though the Cadets won, they hit only 12 of 56 shots in the field goal department, and 14 of 30 charities. In the second tilt with the Savages, free throw percentage improved 17 of 25, but the tries at the bucket dropped to 10 out of 63. This was a new low and in the next clash, a single game with the East Texas Lions, 16 shots in 74 attempts at the bucket connected. This makes a season total of 64 field goals in 256 tries and 55 free throws in 98 attempts. Saturday night, the Aggie hardwood squad dumped in 27 buckets in 52 efforts. They also tallied 11 charities out of 19.

Center Bob Kamperman was in on the rebounds, and, despite the fact that opposing center Murray Mitchell is six feet seven, (Bob is 6-4), he directed more than his share of the balls into the hands of red-clad receivers. On the offense, he dropped 12 points through the hoop. Sam Jenkins can always be counted on to handle his end of the work and alternated with Batey on the floor. Mike Garcia also came through with two buck-
