Roads, Resources Cause Farmers Not To Return to Farm

Poor roads, lack of electricity, and unattractive living conditions are the leading reasons cited by Texas farmers why veterans and other young people do not want to go back to the farm.

Joe R. Motheral, economist in rural life at A. & M., says in a report on trends in Texas farm population that these were the main reasons suggested by a number of correspondents in a poll taken recently among 469 farmers in 47 Texas counties.

Farm population estimates prepared by the A. & M. Experiment Station in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Agricultural Economics indicate that the postwar back to the farm movement of Texas veterans and war workers has slowed down.

Rescue Grass Ready for '48

Thanks to Texas Rescue 46, a new strain of rescue grass developed by the Agricultural Experiment Station, green grazing throughout the winter will be possible. The new strain will be available for general planting in the fall of 1948.

Several strains of Texas Rescue have been tested by the Station, but Texas Rescue 46 has proven to be the most desirable.

Texas Rescue 46 is a winter annual which produces green feed at a time when most other forage plants are dead or dormant. It has a desirable upright growth and a high degree of disease resistance and the new strain produces both high forage yields in the spring and an abundance of seed.

Rules and regulations for the production of certified Texas Rescue 46 grass seed have been formulated, published, and distributed by the Division of Field Seed Certification, State Department of Agriculture, Austin.

Eaton Enroute To Cairo on UN Trip

Dr. Frank M. Eaton of the US Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Plant Industry, College Station, is enroute to Cairo, Egypt to act as an advisor to Near East governments on plans for increased agricultural production.

According to an Associated Press report from the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations, Dr. Eaton is being accompanied by Professor P. E. Neale of the New Mexico State College of Agriculture.

Positions Open In Research Program

Chemists, physicists, engineers, and mathematicians are needed by the Southern Regional Research Laboratory of the Department of Agriculture located in New Orleans, Louisiana, the Civil Service Regional Office has announced.

Applications for the positions, with salaries ranging from \$3,397 to \$5,905 per annum, will be judged on basis training and experience, since no written exam is required.

Exam for Resident Psychiatric Posts

An examination for filling resident-in-training positions in psychiatry at St. Elizabeths Hospital in Washington, D. C. has been announced by the Civil Service Commission.

To qualify, applicants must have completed a fourth year of study in an approved medical school and must have the degree of either BM or MD. In addition, they must have successfully completed an accredited full rotating internship of at least nine months, or must now be serving such internship. No written test is required.
