Organization of the recently completed Livestock Advisory committee to serve in an advisory capacity to the department of animal husbandry has been praised by a member of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association committee.

Clayton Pickett of Fort Stockton, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, along with Sagers Farmer of Junction, first vice-president and Horace Fawcett of Del Rio, past president, make up the committee, have just completed a series of conferences with J. C. Miller, head of the animal husbandry department, and other departmental heads and officials of A&M.

Pickett said the organization of the Livestock Advisory committee was and is a step forward in the livestock industry.

"The animal husbandry department is doing fine work," he said. "We give and take advice," he declared.

The Livestock Advisory committee represents four groups: the Texas Purchers' Association, the Texas and Southwestern Cattlemen's Association, the Beef Cattle and the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, composed of three members each.

Flight Training Course Scheduled For Spring Term

Flight training courses will be offered at the College Airport during the spring term, Dean of Engineering Howard W. Barlow announced today.

Aeronautical Engineering 221, a private pilot's course carrying 3 hours' credit, will be available to non-veterans as well as veterans, he said. The course may be used as an elective in engineering, agriculture, and arts and sciences and will cost a total of \$410.00.

Veterans registering for Aero 221 will have the cost deducted from their future entitlement under present regulations of the Veterans Administration. Barlow said that this would involve 6½ months of eligibility.

Only those veterans who have sufficient eligibility to complete their college work under the GI Bill in addition to the flight course are encouraged to register for the course.

San Antonio Rabbi Will Speak During Religious Week

Dr. David Jacobson, rabbi of Temple Beth-El in San Antonio will speak during Religious Emphasis Week next month. J. Gordon Gay, assistant secretary of the YMCA, announced today.

Rabbi Jacobson, a graduate of the University of Cincinnati, was ordained rabbi by the Hebrew Union College, of Cincinnati in 1934. During the following two years he was rabbi of West Central Liberal Congregation in London while working on his Ph.D. which he received from the University of Cambridge in 1936. On his return he occupied the pulpit of the Indianapolis Hebrew Congregation before going to his present post as rabbi of Temple Beth-El. During the war he left his church to become a Naval Chaplain.

Welfare work of all kinds in San Antonio interests Rabbi Jacobson. He is founder of the San Antonio Council of Social Agencies and a board member of the Community Chest, Red Cross, Boys Clubs, Tuberculosis Association, and the Jewish Social Service Federation.

As an author Rabbi Jacobson wrote "Social Background of the Old Testament" and other papers and articles.

Officer Candidate Schools Open In Army, Air Forces

Officer candidate schools are now opened at Fort Riley, Kansas and Lackland Air Field, San Antonio for Army and Air Force personnel, respectively. Sid Lovelless, chairman of the Brazos County Army Advisory Committee, has announced.

The Army OCS provides the initial six months of training for commission in the Ground Forces combat and service arms, while the Air Force schools provides commissioned administrative and technical personnel.

According to information received from Brigadier E. W. Piburn, an applicant must be between 20½ and 28 years of age, with an Army General Classification test score of 110 or higher and an Officer Candidate test score of at least 115. He must be a United States citizen, physically qualified and have a minimum of a high school education.

Veterans must have been honorably discharged to qualify for entrance to an OCS. Lovelless said.

Non-veterans may qualify if they complete a basic training course or a two-year elementary course in an advanced ROTC unit.

OCS graduates must serve two years as commissioned officers on active duty. Some graduates will be permitted to complete three to six months on active duty, during which they may take further training in a service school and then serve three years with a National Guard or Organized Reserve Corps unit on active duty.

AVC Lists Major Legislative Items

WASHINGTON—Chat Paterson, national chairman of the American Veterans Committee, today listed the eight items of legislation on which the World War II veterans organization would concentrate during the regular session of Congress.

Paterson listed the issues as follows:

Passage of the Taft-Ellender-Wagner long range housing bill; extension of rent control with strengthened enforcement powers; passage of an anti-inflation bill restoring controls on essential items; approval of the Marshall Plan; rejection of the proposed compulsory training program; an increase in subsistence allowances for student veterans; implementation of the report of the President's Committee on Civil Rights by passage of FEPC and allied legislation; and repeal of unworkable provisions of the Taft-Hartley Act.

7 yards on the first play, and Joe Cullinan tossed one to Williamson in the right flat which ended three yards from the Pre-Med forty-yard line. Williamson took the ball again on a right end run which was good for fifteen yards and a penetration.

With the plays running out, Joe Cullinan threw a pass in the end zone which was broken up by the Medic backfield. Williamson took the ball around right end again for the CE's and got another penetration on a ten yard run.

A tackling penalty on the play pushed the Medics back to their three-yard line and Lane made the winning touchdown run on the next play.

With only five plays left in the game the Pre-Meds began passing after receiving the kickoff, but several throws by Sorjes failed to find their mark and the game ended in a tie.

Barrios and Garrelson were the outstanding players for the losing Medics. Both players made a lot of yardage but the Engineers line held twice to stop scoring threats.

One of the chief reasons for the ASCE's win was the play-calling of their captain, Joe Cullinan. When the Engineers running game was stopped, Cullinan took to the air to throw the opposing team off balance.

McClure Wins Two Tickets to Cotton Bowl in NG Drive

Sgt. Marvin R. McClure, member of Headquarters Staff, 386th Armored Engineer Battalion, Texas National Guard, and also sergeant-major of the A&M Cadet Corps, was one of three champion recruiters in the State of Texas during the recent nation-wide recruiting campaign.

Sgt. McClure recruited around 100 men for the two local units of the National Guard and in so doing won two tickets to the January 1 Cotton Bowl game, expenses paid, as well as \$160 in cash prizes.

For his successful recruiting, Sgt. McClure received a certificate of merit from the National Guard Bureau, and letters of congratulation from the Bureau Chief, the Commanding General of the 49th Armored Division of which his unit is a part, and from the Adjutant General of Texas.

Lt. Col. Kay Halsell of Bryan, commanding officer of the engineer unit, stated that he was sure McClure's efforts were motivated by a desire to serve his state and country as much as the prospect of material rewards.

The zeal which McClure exhibited in his recent achievement is indicative of that which led him to attainment of high honors in Scouting, ROTC, and other fields.

Equipment Given ChemE Dept. By Refining Firm

A Potstillniak low temperature distillation column and a recording potentiometer have been added to the facilities of the chemical engineering department, according to an announcement by President Sibb Gilchrist.

The Taylor Refining Company of Corpus Christi has given the distillation column to the college. The recording potentiometer was loaned to the college by the same company.

Dr. J. D. Lindsay, head of the chemical engineering department, said that the distillation column, which was used during the war in the production of synthetic rubber, would be suitable for analyzing petroleum gases. The potentiometer, Lindsay said, was an additional valuable aid to studies being made here.

This equipment was offered to the college through J. L. Sewell, general superintendent of the Corpus Christi concern. Sewell is an A&M graduate.
